### FAMOUS RUZZI BAND FOR DISTRICT FAIR

Senior L. Ruzzi of Portland, has been engaged to furnish the music for the district fair in this city this fall. The contract was signed up late yesterday afternoon and Senior Ruzzi left on the night train for Portland. The Ruzzi band of 25 pieces and three vocalists has been engaged to play at the Walla Walla fair which is to be held the week preceding the Pendleton show and the same organization will be brought from that city to this. Ruzzi's organization has been making a great showing in Portland and the local members of the fair board feel that they are to be congratulated on their choice.  
 For four years Ruzzi has had the contract for furnishing the music at The Oaks in Portland, having opened the present season. Last night his organization with 30 pieces furnished the music for the Hibernians at their big celebration in the Portland armory and tonight it will be the leading band in a procession of six organizations. The Ruzzi band has also been engaged to furnish the music for the big Woodmen of the World convention in Portland next week.

### LARGE CROWD ENJOYS LAST NIGHT'S CONCERT

One of the largest crowds of the season greeted the weekly appearance of the United Orchestra last evening and enjoyed the best concert ever given by that musical organization. That the program was appreciated is evidenced by the fact that every number was encores. Director Caruth had promised an exceptionally good concert and not a single one of the several hundred people who were present was disappointed in the slightest degree.  
 The stringed quintet was especially popular as was also the Grand March from Tannhauser and the Light Cavalry overture. There were other numbers, however, which appeared to elicit nearly as much enthusiastic applause as these master pieces.  
 Though the evening was somewhat threatening, no one seemed to regret away on this account and the affair turned out to be one of the most pleasant of the series.

### EXPECT OIL GUSHER AT ONTARIO SOON

Ontario, Or.—This oil well will be struck very soon in the Ontario oil well is the opinion of R. M. Eames, the greatest oil expert in the northwest after a thorough investigation. This investigation was carried over a period of a day and a half, during which time Mr. Eames exhaustively examined the ballings from the well. The well is down more than 2000 feet. The equipment used is the finest and most complete in the entire northwest.  
 The Ontario Oil & Gas company, in this well struck gas at 900 feet, then again at 1000 feet, and again at 2200 feet at which latter depth the gas pressure was 450 pounds to the square inch. So strong was this pressure that it blew out the 2200 feet of water in the well and shot it 120 feet above the ground.  
 Five thousand dollars, have been spent in this well to date. Ontario people all have profound faith this will be a paying well and they are liberal supporters of this company. Five thousand feet of new derrick are being used. The big derrick has been greatly strengthened. A cement foundation has been made under the Sampson post and main sills. A new 25 horsepower engine has been ordered from Pittsburg and is expected within a week. When it is installed this well will be so equipped that it can be run down 5200 feet or more, if such a thing is necessary.

### ATTORNEY FILES A SUIT AGAINST TIMBER CUTTERS

Boise, Idaho.—United States District Attorney Lingenfelter has filed two timber trespass suits in the federal Court, asking damages to the amount of \$2147.25 for the unlawful cutting of timber in the Coeur d'Alene national forest.  
 The defendants names are S. B. Herron and J. E. Herron, of Larson, Idaho, and Lemma J. Root, of Grangeville. Herron and Herron are charged with felling timber in 1906 and 1907 on land described as the northwest quarter of Section 33, Township 49 north, Range 6 east, and the northeast quarter of Section 32, Township 45 north, Range 6 east.  
 The timber was sawed and marketed as lumber. Root is a homesteader who filed on the southwest quarter of Section 5, Township 29 north, Range 3 east, and felled timber which, when sawed into lumber, made 100,000 feet board measure, valued at \$1000.
