Weston, Or., July 26.—The threshing outfit of O'Harra & McBride met with an accident the other day in the sudden breaking of the cylinder shaft of their machine, which resulted in two or more days' loss of time before repairs could be made but now work has been resumed and everything is going along satisfactorily.

The threshing of the grain on the Earl Dudley farm north of town is averaging about 35 bushels to the acre and of good quality.

The wind which prevailed here for a day or so shattered some of the over-ripe wheat and caused quite a loss in averaging up the yield.

As a rule labor during the harvesting season is always scarce in this vicinity but this year it is an exception for apparently the threshermen have been well supplied and very few inquiries have been made, "Where can I get a man to work?" It is also reported that there is a better class of workmen this year than usual, men who stay with their jobs.

CLEARING HOUSE FOR R. R. MERCHANDISE

London.—A clearing house for goods is the latest solution suggested in dealing with the enormous quantities of merchandise and produce which daily arrive here, and a special meeting of the London chamber of commerce is to be called to consider the plan. Its originators say that as soon as it is carried out it will at once set free the 20,000,000 square feet at present occupied by the freight depots of London, and place at the disposal of the railroad companies a capital of \$500,000,000 which is at present locked up in those stations.

Briefly stated, the idea is to acquire a site near King's Cross railroad station, so as to be within easy access of the principal terminal, and to erect upon it a clearing house capable of dealing with the freight traffic now centered at the various stations.

The goods will be brought from the warehouses or the receiving depots to the clearing house in bulk, and thence transferred by means of cranes to the sorting platforms. There the goods will be placed in a "container" bearing the name of the particular railway on whose system the delivery place of the parcel is situated.

Then the mere pressing of an electric button will serve to transfer the container from the platform to the railway truck on which it will proceed to its journey's end.

WHISTLE TROUBLE ENDS.

Walla Walla Hopes to Have No More False Fire Alarms.

Walla Walla, Wash.—After months of trouble over the fire whistle proposition, it has been finally settled with the letting of the contract for a new air compressor to the Gilbert Hunt company. The price to be paid for the new compressor is \$482, and the machine will automatically keep the required amount of compressed air to sound at all times the fire warning.

There has been trouble galore over the whistle. First one and then another was tried. A nearby laundry furnished steam for its operation, but it had the disadvantage of not being available at night. Then another plan was tried, using compressed air, but it did not work, and bids were asked for a new one. In the meantime a steam whistle had been used, which sounded so much like that of a locomotive in the yards that Chief Metz often made mad dashes to imaginary blazes. Then, too, some one began to use it surreptitiously, and false alarms were sounded. But now the trouble is thought to be over, and the new whistle will be installed at once.

"COLD FEET" DELAYS BOAT.

Hornet, Sold by U. S. to Private Parties, Starts on Mysterious Voyage.

Norfolk, Va.—Forced to spend 29 hours in Hampton Roads because a portion of her crew got "cold feet" the gunboat Hornet, which left Norfolk at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon did not pass Cape Henry until 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon. One engineer quit the ship, and then seven Swedes refused to go further than New Orleans. The little vessel all ready for the voyage tried hard to get men. All efforts to secure a crew failed because the pay offered was not considered sufficient. The vessel finally succeeded in getting three American engineers.

A revenue cutter, believed to be the Onondaga, passed Cape Henry Saturday evening, and will keep an eye on the Hornet all the way down the coast to New Orleans. The Hornet carried a big deck load of bags said to contain coal. It was denied that the government inspected the bags, but T. S. Roberts, representing the purchasers of the Hornet, admitted that the vessel was bound to Bluefields Nicaragua, and would not be used as a pleasure craft.

The government recently sold the craft to Isaac Starn of New Orleans for \$5,100. It cost \$117,500 20 years ago. It is said the vessel was bought for Estrada, to put the Venus, the Madrid "navy" out of business.

GOING AFTER OREGON GOLD.

Smelter Plant at Sumpter to Be Started Up.

Portland, Ore.—Within 60 days it is promised that the Northwestern Smelting and Refining Co.'s plant at Sumpter will be in active operation, and within a short time there-

after it is believed that ore will be coming from the old mines of the Baker county district in sufficient quantities to supply the full capacity of the plant. It is believed that the American Smelting and Refining company is behind the activity. Superintendent Fred W. Scofield is on the ground and has employed a force of men to overhaul the machinery and equipment of the smelter.

The information of the intentions of the smelter company to begin again garnering the gold of the district, which has practically been abandoned since 1907, was brought to Portland today by David Wilson of Spokane. He is one of the pioneers of the eastern Oregon gold camp and is making preparations to remove his family to Portland, where they will take up their home.

"I can not advise you as to whether the Guggenheims are behind the plans of Mr. Scofield or not," said Mr. Wilson yesterday, "but it is true that the low grade ores of the Sumpter district are to be worked."
