

### FORMER MILTON GIRL DIED ON SATURDAY

MRS. BERTHA RA COTT  
DIES FROM ABSCESS

Passes Away at College Place Sanitarium—Funeral Yesterday—Other News Items From Milton.

Milton, Ore., Aug. 1.—The funeral of Mrs. Bertha RaCott was held at College Place at 10 o'clock Sunday morning. She had been a great sufferer during the past two months with abscesses, following an operation for appendicitis. She was the daughter of E. A. Walker, a prominent business man of Milton and had lived here several years, where she was greatly loved and respected by all who knew her. She was married about 11 months ago to Jack RaCott, a contractor of Elgin, and they made their home in this city. She was 21 years of age. Besides her parents and husband she leaves three sisters and two brothers to mourn her loss. They are Mrs. George Allen, Mrs. C. F. Willingford, Miss Mepha Walker, John and Henry Walker, all of this city. Her death occurred at the College Place sanitarium at 2:30 Saturday afternoon.

### HOUSE OF LORDS ABOVE AVERAGE OF INTELLECT

London.—The relation between the science of eugenics and the House of Lords has been raised by David Heron, a noted writer, that "under the present system the House of Lords is likely to be somewhat, but not markedly, above the average ability."

Mr. Heron points out that "excluding the bishops and representative peers, 181 Peers, out of a total of 543 have been created during the last 20 years. Similarly 77 peerages fall in the period of 1850-1880; 90 between 1820 and 1850, and so on. The list extends back to the period of 1280-1310, and in the case of five peerages no advance in rank has taken place since that time. The average date of the creation of those peerages is 1317."

"At this stage we must take into account several factors of which we have no definite measure. In the first place we do not know the exact degree of assortative mating in the peerage; that is, we do not know how closely husband and wife resemble each other. It is, however, very probable that it is considerably higher than in the general population."

"Further, in the case of many peers selections have taken place not once but several times. Thus the Marquis of Lansdown and also Earl Kerry, and Shelburne and Lord Marine; selection may accordingly be said to have operated three times. Both those factors tend to increase the stringency of selection, and to increase the average ability which is to be expected."

"A third factor acts in the opposite direction and has an unfavorable influence. It has been shown that the first two members of a family are slightly more liable to insanity, tuberculosis, albinism and criminality than the later born members."

### ATHENA HARVEST PROGRESSING FAST

TWO WEEKS MORE WILL  
SEE MOST OF GRAIN CUT

Yields range from 35 to 60 bushels an acre—Wheat is testing from 60 to 61—Very free from smut—Best of weather prevails.

(Special Correspondence.)

Athena, Ore., July 29.—Harvest in this vicinity is progressing very rapidly and it will be but two more weeks and the greater part of the grain will be in the sack. The yield here this year is very good as it ranges from 35 to 60 bushels per acre and is No. 1 wheat. Some wheat is being hauled already into the various warehouses and according to a statement given out by B. B. Richards, local agent for the Puget Sound Warehouse company, the wheat is testing from 60 to 61 and has less smut in it than any year of record in this vicinity.

The best of wheat weather has prevailed throughout this season and if it continued to be so, with the fifty combines and ten stationary outfits that are at work in this county, harvest will soon be a thing of the past for this year.

The combine in this county seems to be the favored reaper and they are so plentiful that almost every farmer either has an interest in a combine or has one of his own. All of the wheatgrowers say they find it a saving of fifty per cent over the header and thrasher, which is the main item in the choice of machinery. If the sale of combined harvesters increases within the next two years as it has in the past two seasons, 1912 will see them in almost three-fourths of the farm machine sheds.

### STRANGE MIDNIGHT CALL URGES PARSON

London.—A stirring account of a midnight call to a new field of duty was given to the parishioners of Braintree by their new vicar, the Rev. Thomas Eddiestone, who began his duties there this week.

Mr. Eddiestone last March gave up his rectory at High Roding, where his work was eminently successful, for the more responsible but considerably less valuable living of Braintree. After he had read the 22-line articles, according to the church rule, Mr. Eddiestone told his new congregation why he felt impelled to make the change.

"Some weeks ago," he said, "before I knew that the vicarage of Braintree was about to become vacant, I woke up in the middle of the night at High Roding, with a strange passage of Scripture ringing in my ears. 'I had not read the passage for a long time, and was at a loss to account for it recurring to me. The passage was: 'Take this child away and nurse it for me, and I will give thee thy wages.'"

"I thought at first there must be some child in High Roding who was neglected or in distress, and for two days I searched about the parish, but could not find any such one."

"Then came the offer of the living of Braintree, and although the stipend was less I answered the letter, accepting, as I felt the call had come to me direct to nurse the children of Braintree."
