

# JULY STOCK MARKET HELD FAIRLY STRONG

D. O. LIVELY SAYS RECEIPTS WERE LIBERAL

414 Cars of Stock Received at Portland Yards During Month of July—Cattle Market Closed As Strong As It Opened—Good Business in Milk Cows.

July is usually a dull month in livestock markets but, according to D. O. Lively, receipts at the Portland Union stock yards were fairly liberal. The total number of cars were 414, in which were 6559 cattle, 6933 hogs, 15,143 sheep and 331 horses and mules. As compared with last year there was a decrease of 785 cattle, an increase of 6504 hogs, an increase of 1336 sheep and an increase of 39 horses and mules.

Items of interest in connection with the market include the building up of quite a business in the purchase and sale of milk cows. Dairy men are looking to the Portland Union stock yards as a market place for the reason that all cows offered for sale here are tested by a government inspector free of charge.

James J. Hill of the Hill lines and Robert S. Lovett of the Harriman lines, will be vice presidents of the fat stock show to be given at the yards, next March. A number of distinguished stock men in the Pacific northwest and throughout the United States will act as officers of this show.

The proper grading of cattle on this market and the paying of what the difference between good and thin quality represents to the shipper, has caused the cattle men of the country to turn their attention toward grain feeding and this fall and winter will probably see more grain fed cattle in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California, than in any previous year. Good grain fed cattle are worth from 1 to 1-1/2 cents more per pound than hay fed cattle. At the difference it will pay the feeders to use grain.

A good barley crop, plenty of oats, an abundance of alfalfa and a high market make swine raising popular and that most profitable of all crops is receiving much attention in the Pacific northwest. It is doubtful if supply ever catches up with demand, and preparing hogs for the Portland market is the surest and safest business open to the farmer.

## ERROR IN ENROLLING CAUSES COMPLICATION

Salem, Or.—An error in enrolling house joint resolution No. 15 so as to make it appear to be an amendment of article IX of the constitution and repealing every provision contained therein for the raising of state revenues instead of adding article XIX as the original resolution, plainly shows the provision that the state may build and operate its own railroads, is not a ground to cause any undue alarm for the supreme court would probably hold that there was no intention on the part of the legislature to repeal every provision in the constitution for levying taxes in order to provide for state aided railroads. Both provisions would stand.

This view also dispels the apprehension that the proposed railroad amendment conflicts with another amendment proposed by the legislature and adoption of which is urged by the tax commission providing for classification of taxable property for assessment purposes. As the railroad amendment was intended to add article XIX instead of being an amendment of article IX there is no conflict.

The original and enrolled resolution plainly sets forth that "an amendment is proposed to the constitution of Oregon as follows:" but the enrolled resolution entitles it article IX by mistake. Had the legislature intended to amend article IX, the resolution would have stated in the preamble that "it is proposed to amend article IX as follows, etc." There are now just 18 articles in the constitution and there is no doubt that the railroad amendment was intended clearly as an additional article to be numbered XIX.

## \$200,000,000 NORTHWEST TRADE IF CITIES WILL COMBINE

Seattle, Wash.—"If Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, Vancouver and Victoria will stick together and work together for their common good, a trade worth \$200,000,000 a year will come to the Pacific Northwest from South America. This is no exaggeration. I have documentary evidence to prove it. I also have documentary evidence to support the statement that Europe, through international steamship lines, is in a conspiracy to cut the United States, and even the Dominion of Canada, out of trade that, from the geographical locations of the two nations, should come to them." This statement was Thursday made by I. E. Moses, vice-president of the Seattle Commercial club, and one of the wealthiest men of this city. Mr. Moses spent the last nine months in South America and in Europe, and made a thorough study of conditions. "South America wants to trade with the Pacific Northwest," he said. "The steamship trust regulating rates, however, forbid it. It forbids equitable rates anywhere but out of the port of New York, and out of that port the rates are all in favor of other competing nations. I am not an alarmist.

"I am conservative in the highest degree, but I want to say that, if the Pacific Northwest has any sense whatever, it will get together, send a representative to South America to study conditions and, irrespective of locality, systematically work for a Northwest commerce with South America. It is not a Seattle proposition. It is a Northwest proposition, and Northwest cities should all combine and work in harmony for the common good of this section. The result will be astonishing, and I'm going to ask the Seattle Commercial club to take up the matter with the commercial clubs and the chambers of commerce of Portland, Vancouver, Tacoma and others of our cities. And there is not one cent in it for me outside of the profits that will come to me through increased valuations of my realty holdings in Seattle if this city and the Pacific northwest boom."

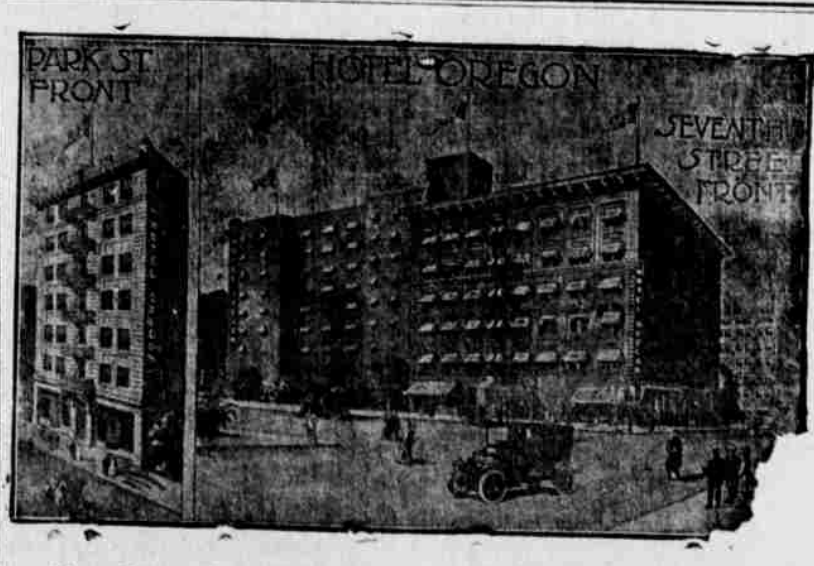
