On Hunting Trip.
Col. J. H. Raley, who arrived home from Portland yesterday morning has left upon a grouse hunting trip to the mountains.

Seeks Re-election.
Ralph Polson, present coroner, is today preparing to circulate petitions asking for his re-nomination as the republican candidate for coroner.

Wheat Market Dull.
In the local wheat market quiet still reigns and to use a well worn phrase, there is "nothing doing." Club wheat is quoted today at 78 cents and bluestem at 88.

After the Grouse.
E. F. Averill and R. W. Fletcher, both of the East Oregonian office, left Saturday evening for the mountains. They fished yesterday and have been hunting grouse today.

Two Marriage Licenses.
A marriage license was issued today to Roy Hutchinson and Miss Claire Earl. Saturday afternoon a license to wed was granted Albert V. Humphries and Miss Daura M. Brown.

1900 Have Registered.
Unless Umatilla county voters hasten to register during the next three weeks the total number of registered voters for the primary election will be light. At this time according to William Sutherland, registration clerk, only 1900 voters have registered out of the 4000 or more within the county.

Did Not Have Licenses.
In the police court this afternoon a hearing is being given I. Lake and John Halligan upon the charge of doing barber work without first having secured licenses. Lake is the proprietor of a shop on Main street and Halligan has been working for him. Since the complaints were made they have secured licenses.

Make Registering Convenient.
"Why not have a registration booth down on Main street so that people can register without going to the courthouse," said a well known business man yesterday. Continuing he suggested that the booth be kept open in the evening for a time so as to accommodate men who work ten hours a day and do not have an opportunity to register during the regular hours.

Would Succeed His Father.
Geary Kimbrell, son of County Surveyor J. W. Kimbrell, has announced his candidacy for county surveyor to succeed his father. He is a native of eastern Oregon and has lived in Pendleton for 15 years. He has been deputy surveyor for the past eight years. At this time Mr. Kimbrell and C. E. McComber represent the only aspirants for this position.

Many Hunt Grouse.
Today is the first day of the open season for grouse and as a result many are now in the mountains seeking to bag a few birds before they become "scary." At the county clerk's office there has been an unusual rush for hunters' licenses during the past few days. A total of 419 licenses have been issued so far this year.

Must File Intentions.
Because their petitions were circulated before first being filed with the county clerk several petitions that reached the clerk's office today have been sent back to the senders. According to Deputy Clerk R. F. Brown, the law specifies that copies of the petition must be filed with the clerk's office at the time they are placed in circulation. It will not do to first circulate the petitions and then file them with the county clerk. County candidates have until 15 days before the primary election to file their signed petitions.

A Monumental Lie.
According to a news story from Vancouver, Wash., a young man named Arthur Sexton has been arrested charged with forging checks on bankers at this place, at Walla Walla, Pasco, Castle Rock, Pocatello and Jerome, Idaho. According to the confession made by Sexton to the officers at Vancouver, Wash., he had while here raised checks upon the American National bank, the check having been issued by James Bain. At the bank it is denied that such a check has ever been received and Sexton is regarded as being a monumental liar or else it having become mixed up over his misdeeds.

Labor Men Oppose Wilson.
Newark, N. J., Aug. 15.—Pronounced opposition to the candidacy of Dr. Woodrow Wilson, president of Princeton University, for the democratic nomination for governor of New Jersey, developed today at the opening of the convention of the State Federation of Labor. An attempt will be made to secure the passage of resolutions condemning the great educator, on account of his alleged utterances on the organized labor question.

ENGINEER EXAMINES EMBRYONIC PROJECTS

JOHN T. WHISTLER WILL MAKE EXPERT INVESTIGATION

Well Known Reclamation Engineer on Scene of Rock Reservoir and Canal Company's Proposed Project—Will Make Preliminary Survey of McKay Creek Project.

John T. Whistler, former reclamation engineer and the builder of the Umatilla project, is now out south of Pilot Rock investigating the feasibility of the scheme to water 5000 acres of land under the enterprise proposed by the Rock Reservoir and Canal company.

As announced by the East Oregonian last Tuesday this company is headed by J. H. Burgess and it is the intention to build a dam at the junction of Stanley and Alcott creeks. The flood waters of the two streams will then be stored and used to water land lying between the reservoir and the town of Pilot Rock.

Engineer Whistler arrived in Pendleton Saturday evening and went southward yesterday. As soon as he has finished the work of inspecting the above named company's project he will return and make a preliminary survey of the McKay creek project. Farmers on McKay creek are figuring upon damming that stream at the point where the two forks join. The flood waters will be used to water land lying in the McKay valley and upon either side of that little stream.

NEWPORT TO ENTERTAIN FLEET

Stay of Fleet at Fashionable Resort Will Be Memorable Occasion.

Newport, R. I., Aug. 15.—Today the Atlantic battleship fleet enters upon the first installment of its Newport welcome—a demonstration that will continue through a solid week of liberal hospitality and unbroken entertainment of the officers and men of the sixteen battleships. The stay of the fleet is intended to be made one of the greatest celebrations of its kind in the history of this famous resort.

ROCKEFELLER'S BATHS OF WHISKY ARE SCOPED AT

London.—The cabled reports about John D. Rockefeller's whisky bath have caused a good deal of amusement and no little interest here, but physicians scoff at the idea. Said one medical expert well known for his knowledge of the virtues and vices of alcohol:

"Alcohol applied to the skin can have no more effect in supplying the system with nutrition than would oil, the value of which in its right place Rockefeller knows better than I do. Applied to a black eye alcohol, gently administered, has a soothing effect. It allays pain, prevents swelling and as an absorbent and solvent under certain conditions is invaluable. Taken internally, say when you are physically numb, it is a capital stimulant. But from one end of Harley street to the other you will not get a physician to tell you that either internally or externally it can add vitality to the tissues.

"An old man needs nutritive food in sparing quantities but with all respect to Dr. Biggar, he is only, it seems to me, exciting his patient and falsifying instead of increasing his vitality. Besides when a body is heated, as it must be under a massage, alcohol freezes the pores. Mud-baths, vapor baths and other baths open the natural gateway of the human system, but this plan locks them up. It is ridiculous."

CHOLERA RAVAGING RUSSIAN DISTRICTS

St. Petersburg.—Russia's scourge, the cholera, continues to spread with alarming rapidity, particularly in the southern mining districts and in St. Petersburg, where the conditions are fast approaching the proportions of the great epidemic of 1908.

Figures furnished today by the Central Sanitary Bureau show that in the week from July 24th to July 30th there were 15,244 cases of cholera and 6,944 deaths. Of these 4,870 cases and 233 deaths were reported from the Province of Yegaterinozlay and the territory of the Don Cossacks in South Russia.

A report from the United Mine Owners' association, covering forty-eight mines and four foundries, gives 2,970 cases and 1,250 deaths. The extent of the panic among the miners is shown by figures furnished from eighteen mines, from which 18,000 of the 46,000 employees have fled.

In answer to the appeal of the association for special measures to check the epidemic and stem the panic, which threatens to stop the production of coal and iron in South Russia, the government today decided to send to the mining region a special commission to study the situation and organize sanitary preventive work.

The desertion of work by the laborers extends also to the railroad employees and the workmen in the ports in South Russia, threatening to cripple the export movement of grain. Advice from Yekaterinoslav report that the transport of the crops is at a standstill.

The epidemic continues to make enormous progress in the capital, where the daily average of cases jumped last week to thirty. The high record reached in 1908 with 412 cases a day.

way. He is an expert corset designer. Here is how he sizes up the typical women of Europe:
"Let us begin with the French woman. She is not beautiful in the first place. She is not even too thin; she has a very short waist. She has no shoulders and no hips. Her nose is hooked—she is entirely without our graceful poised nose. Her complexion is usually a work of art, and her eyes are large and pretty, but her face as a whole is a disappointment, while her figure is very poor. Her real charm lies in her clothes and the way she wears them. Besides, she is always a brunette, and the monotony of the type is most wearisome."
"The German woman is heavy and muscular in appearance. She, too, is short, and yet unlike the French woman. She is very stout—much too stout. Her features are hard and harsh, and even her red cheeks soon acquire a blown look. She has absolutely no neck and she is always a blonde—there is no variation there either."
"I find serious fault with the English woman. She is too long. She has done so much walking that she has lengthened herself into a living slab. Her shoulders are high and square, too, instead of sloping. Her face is strong rather than beautiful. She has a long chin and a high forehead. She has very slight bust development and she often stoops as if she were afraid of her own weight. Besides, she dresses so badly."
"The Italian girl is apt to be over-developed. The girls of Greece are too small and thin. I have never seen a goddess among them. The girls in Austria-Hungary were really the most attractive ones I saw in Europe, but they are somewhat too small. You see, it all comes back to the American girl."
He continued:
"The American girl is tall and not yet too tall, slender, and yet developed in appearance. She has beautiful sloping shoulders and a long waist. She has hips, though she is rather foolishly trying to conceal the damning circumstance at present. She has beautifully long, exquisitely modeled arms. Her feet are slender, if not tiny. Her features are regular and clear cut. She has the most beautiful chin in the world, round and yet straight. Her profile is exquisite. Her neck is neither too long nor too short, and she dresses perfectly."
