WILL INVESTIGATE DIFFERENT PROJECTS

ASSISTANT TO STATE ENGINEER ON TOUR

Percy A. Cupper Will Visit all of Oregon's Carey Act Projects in Eastern Oregon—Lewis Unable to Make Trip.

According to dispatches from Salem, a complete investigation of eastern Oregon's Carey act projects is to be made by Percy A. Cupper, assistant to State Engineer John H. Lewis. He will leave the state capital Monday morning and will visit everyone of the projects in the eastern part of the state.

State Engineer Lewis is unable to leave just at this time, owing to the pressure of business in the office and from the fact that he almost daily expects to be called upon to take the projected trip down the Columbia river for the purpose of settling the Oregon-Washington boundary line matter. He has also been subpoenaed to appear at a water right case in The Dalles.

As the trip through the state, half of which has been completed, is being carried out under instruction from the Water Board, the State Engineer decided not to postpone it further and sends his assistant. The information collected by Cupper will be used by State Engineer Lewis in making reports to the Desert Land Board and the Secretary of the Interior, as required by law, before further steps may be taken in furthering the Carey act projects.

Mr. Cupper will be at Ironsides August 24 to inspect the surveys of Willow creek, made in connection with the water right adjudications before the Board of Control. He will be present at a hearing at Ironsides August 24, and at Vale, August 29. F. M. Saxton, superintendent of Water Division No. 2, will take the testimony in these water matters.

On August 31 testimony will be taken at Vale on the adjudication of rights on Cottonwood creek, in Malheur county. Cupper will then examine the engineering features of Harper Basin, a 10,000-acre project, southeast of Westfall. This will be inspected principally to ascertain the sufficiency of the water supply and the feasibility of the reclamation plan.

From these points Cupper will go to Jordan Valley, on the Idaho line, for a similar inspection of the 50,000-acre Carey act project. Water for this scheme will be stored in Idaho by a 150-foot dam on Jordan creek, a few miles over the line. This appears to be one of the most promising projects initiated under the water laws of 1909, in the opinion of the State Engineer.

Cupper then proposes to inspect the Pine Valley project, in Baker county. This includes 10,000 acres and the lands are within a few miles of the Snake river. Transportation facilities for this scheme have already been provided through the construction of a railroad down the Snake river from Huntington to the Oxbow power project.

The Eagle Valley project will also be in line for an inspection. Here are 30,000 acres under the Carey act and are located a few miles south of Pine Valley. The water here is derived partly by storage and partly by the regular flow of Eagle creek. Cupper will proceed by stage from this point to the Lower Powder valley, where there is a project of 50,000 acres.

Mr. Cupper hopes to gather sufficient information here to complete the report on the water supply and this will probably complete the circuit of the state projects which has been undertaken by State Engineer Lewis this summer. He previously inspected all of the projects through the Deschutes country and in southern Oregon.

His report of progress on his return from that trip was exceedingly flattering to the general development of Oregon and he believes that his assistant will return from eastern Oregon with reports that are equally as pleasing.
