## NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

### Falls on "Rat," Is Unhurt.

Pullman, Wash.—A nurse in a local hospital, who is a devotee of horseback riding, recently was thrown from her horse. She struck the ground fairly on the top of her head, but this was crowned with a large and firmly built "rat" which so "broke the fall" that the young lady was uninjured. Her escape from a fractured skull is attributed by Dr. Campbell to the "rat."

### Wallowa Woman Dies.

Wallowa, Or.—Mrs. R. E. Finley died in this city Wednesday, aged 80 years, 6 months and 1 day. Rachel Eliza Finley, whose maiden name was Powers, was born in Henry county, Tennessee, February 22, 1830 and at the age of 19 married William Finley. She made her home in Tennessee and Kentucky until last March, when she came to Wallowa to make her home with her sons. She is survived by four sons, Thomas, John, Joshua and Henry, all of this city, and one daughter, Mrs. Frances Wisehart of Calloway county Kentucky.

### Will Test Law.

Baker City, Or.—Both wholesale and retail grocers are greatly interested in the case of the state of Oregon vs. Frederick C. Cavers, which will come up for hearing at the September term of court. It is a case to test the constitutionality of the law passed by the last legislature prohibiting peddling without a license and defining peddlers as anyone who sells goods to parties other than retailers. Cavers is a member of the firm of Gordon & Cavers company of Boise, wholesale grocers, and was fined \$100 in the justice court for Richland for peddling without a license. He makes the defense that he was engaged in interstate commerce and that the Oregon law is unconstitutional. District Attorney Levens will appear for the state and Gustav Anderson, city attorney, has been engaged to handle the case for Cavers.

### Millers Blamed for Wheat Prices.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Until the millers of the northwest quit bidding high for wheat there will be no large sales made, declares H. P. Kershaw of Tacoma, representative of the Fransoll Grain Buying company of that city. He says that the stagnation in the market is due to the millers' boosting wheat until the farmers believe the real market price is where it is now quoted.

No grain can be bought by exporters at this price, he claims, and farmers must come to the realization that their product is not worth what has been the price. Wheat is now rated on the basis of club at 80 cents.

Despite this statement, exporters here have been offering the prevailing price, but farmers are not unwilling to sell, and last week nearly a million bushels changed hands at this figure.

### Lightning Kills Man.

Oswego, Or.—Ray Thomas was struck by lightning and instantly killed here Sunday. He was the 23-year-old son of J. W. Thomas, mayor of Oswego. The young man was killed at 1 o'clock, during a storm which lasted about three-quarters of an hour. His body was found by Mr. Jenne, of Jenne & Erter, about 20 minutes later.

The young man was boarding with Mr. Jenne, who conducts a butcher shop at Oswego. The lad had been driving the wagon. Just before the lightning killed him he had gone to the barn to feed the horses. Suddenly there was a loud report and the vivid flash struck the barn. Investigation plainly showed where the flame had struck the cupola, and had run down a rafter and into a post beside Thomas' body. From the appearance of the body, the electricity seemed to have struck him in the back.

### Finds Remedy for Pest.

Wenatchee, Wash.—The red spider, a fruit pest which has been a source of great annoyance in fruit sections in the northwest for the last few years, has at last been conquered in the Wenatchee valley by R. E. Trumble, professor of horticulture in the Wenatchee high school and well known to fruit growers for his study of many of the big fruit pests.

The appearance of the spider in large quantities during the season made some preventive necessary, and after many experiments Professor Trumble has been successful in finding a spray that is being used and entirely eliminates the pests from orchards which have been affected.

The department of horticulture in the local high school has become indispensable and the patrons of the school are exerting every effort in aiding the school board to extend the scope of the work.

### MRS. GEORGE KEPPEL IS SOCIAL FIGURE NO MORE

London.—It has only just leaked out that in the last hours King Edward's thoughts were of his old friends.

Sir Ernest Gassel was among the last to see Edward in his conscious moments. It was on the morning of his death, and the king's last and only words to the famous financier were to look after and make proper provision for Mrs. George Keppel. This has undoubtedly been done, but notwithstanding Sir Ernest's continued close friendship and support, Mrs. Keppel, and for that matter Gassel himself, are no longer shining lights in royal circles. In fact, all members of that exclusive set—notables who enjoy the favor of the present king and queen—know of their majesties' dislike of the Keppel group. Taking heed, they have cold shouldered the latter with the result that in the few social functions which have taken place during the present period of mourning, Mrs. Keppel has been conspicuous by her absence, and it is said that she has spent much of her time in Paris, where she has been seen in the company of Cornet Vanderbilt. It is also stated that Sir Thomas Lipton and Mrs. Willie James are among others who have fallen under the ban of royal displeasure.

### Policeman Saves Baby.

New York.—Policeman Robert Bolle of the Fourth avenue station saved 2-year-old Sadie Plish of 38 Third street from being crushed to death by a Smith street trolley car at Smith and Third streets. The policeman was sitting on the front seat of the car, and from behind a wagon coming in the opposite direction he saw the little girl appear and try to cross the tracks. She was directly in front of the car when it was almost upon her.

While the motorman tugged at the brakes the policeman swung himself down on the fender just as it struck the girl and grabbed her. The child escaped injury with the exception of a cut on the nose. An ambulance from the Long Island College Hospital was summoned, but not needed. Passengers congratulated Policeman Bolle.

### THRILLING ARREST OF WOULD-BE SUICIDE

New York.—People in Williamsburg, about half past 10 in the morning, saw a police officer clinging precariously to the network of the bridge with one hand, while with the other he held by the collar a dangling man. They were some 125 feet above the street and the possibilities were thrilling to the onlookers.

After 10 minutes of determined holding on by the policeman, other men crawled down on the network of steel and managed to relieve him of his burden. They were just in time, for the officer was growing faint and could not have held on much longer.

The man they had rescued proved to be Solomon Prezzen, a maker of wallets, who, though still in his twenties, was so much discouraged with life, through being out of work, that he wanted to commit suicide by jumping off the bridge. Patrolman Schillings had arrived just in time to get a firm grip on his collar. Captain Tracy and Sergeant John J. Walters were the men who made the final rescue.
