AVIATORS ARM AGAINST HARM IN RUBBER SUITS

Paris.—Future aviators will be armed against injury from falls by pneumatic rubber suits. A competition for designs is being arranged by the National Aerial league. The pneumatic suit is to protect the air man in falling from moderate heights. The parachute, which will be carried on the aeroplane, must be made to open automatically.

Some of the competitors will doubtless work out Ruyard Kipling's suggestion for an air man's pneumatic suit which the famous author published in an English automobile paper recently. "I suggest," he wrote, "a helmet of rubber, inflated on the crown of the head and round the back and over the collar bones. What you want is the protection of the neck against a backward or forward wrench. The height of the padding on the shoulders ought to cushion off the worst of a sideways wrench, and the rubber, being moderately thick, acts as a slight protection against bits of broken stays and things. The main thing would be to give the spinal cord a chance not to be snapped, and to protect the dome of the head from fracture. You would have to make the rolls under the chin pretty thick, so that the head could be driven down on to them without too much harm."

ARMED EXPEDITIONS OF ENGLAND RESENTED

Berlin.—The British preparations for a possible advance of a military force into Tibet have excited adverse comment here, where they have come in the nature of a surprise. It is pointed out that England's action is contrary to the convention concluded with China and Tibet and to the Anglo-Russian treaty regarding Central Asia concluded in August, 1907. The clause regarding the prohibition of scientific expeditions into Tibet, however, will expire in a month's time, and it is asked ironically whether the advance can be styled a scientific one.

The Vassische Zeitung says: "Why does England send forces into Tibet? Is the expedition intended to compensate England for Russia's progress in the north of Persia and the position she has attained in Manchuria?"

"These questions are unsolved riddles. The real purpose can scarcely be any other than the restoration of the Youngusband treaty, which the English government repudiated after its conclusion."

LONG STANDING CLAIM HAS BEEN SETTLED

Vienna.—A financial settlement has at last been reached, after years of negotiations, between the lawyers of Prince Philip of Sax Coburg and his divorced wife, Princess Louise of Belgium. The princess has admitted a debt of \$400,000 to her former husband. Under the present agreement, the monthly payments hitherto made to the princess by Prince Philip will be dispensed with, and he will compound for the allowance by the payment of a lump sum of \$200,000, which will be deducted from the amount already owed by the princess to her former husband. The princess's claims are secured upon the provisional division of the estate left by the late King Leopold.

DOCTORS ABANDON CITY EIGHT YEARS DEATHLESS

Madrid.—The village of Cobena, a few miles out of this city, has an enviable record. For eight years not a single death has occurred there. The village doctor has left this to him, uncongenial spot, and the chemist has closed his dispensary to open a restaurant. Part of the local cemetery has been converted into a kitchen garden, and the sexton has applied for another situation.

TWO YANKEE ENGINEERS TO MOVE ANCIENT TOWER

Brussels.—Two American engineers with eight workmen, are engaged in moving an ancient church tower at Bochoit a distance of 50 feet. The tower, which is 600 years old, weighs 1700 tons. New foundations have been prepared for it, and an elaborate arrangement of machinery to move it along. The journey is expected to occupy a week.
