

HERMISTON VOTERS REGISTER LAST DAY

TOTAL OF 267 PUT NAMES ON BOOKS

Republicans Have Big Majority—Some Voters in Outlying Districts Will Not Vote—Other Short Items.

(Special Correspondence.)

Hermiston, Ore., Sept. 15.—Yesterday was the last day for registration and a goodly number showed up on the last day. According to figures obtained from registration officials there has been registered a total of 267 voters. Of this number there are 135 republicans, 44 democrats, 14 socialists, 7 independents, 1 prohibitionist 14 who refused to give any political affiliation and 1 populist. There were two from the Stanfield precinct and 12 from the Umatilla precinct. There were a number of voters in the Hermiston precinct who failed to register and a greater number from the Umatilla precinct, these voters being located north of Hermiston in the Third Unit and it is doubtful if any of them go to the polls at all, on account of having to go out of their way to Umatilla to vote. There are a great many new people in all parts of the project who have only been here for a short time and therefore are not entitled to a vote this election.

INDIAN SCALPED.

Firewater Puts Redskin Under Wheels of Train.

Succumbing to the red man's temptation, "firewater," Jim Moody, a Warm Springs Indian, was killed early yesterday morning by a Southern Pacific train north of Brooks.

His body was discovered by A. Jones who telegraphed Coroner Clough. The top of the Indian's head was torn off and another gruesome feature was the fact that his clothing was burned off to the waist, matches or a pipe doubtless having been the cause. The horse ridden by the unfortunate man was also killed, both having been carried across a cattle-guard, the horse being thrown to one side of the track and the man on the other. One of the dead man's shoes was missing, and his coat, vest and shirt burned away.

Coroner Clough brought the remains to the city and succeeded in locating the wife and two sons at Wolf's hop yard. Later in the day a half dozen of his kinsmen in native dress called at the undertaking parlors and made arrangements to have the body shipped to the Warm Springs agency for burial.

On Sunday evening a party of Indian horsemen, among whom was the man killed, visited Wacoada, on the Oregon Electric, one mile west of where the tragedy occurred and seemed very much under the influence of liquor, but how the man killed became separated from his companion is not known. No inquest was held.—Statesman.

DREDGE WALLOWA BUSY ON SNAKE RIVER

Lewiston, Idaho.—Captain Ralph Baughman, who is in charge of the United States dredge boat Wallowa, arrived in the city yesterday from Palouse rapids, eight miles below Riparia, where the boat has been engaged on river improvement work since July 14. Captain Baughman states the work there will be completed in about three weeks and he will then take the dredge to a point known as False Palouse, where a 60-foot ledge, which occupies a dangerous position in the channel, will be blasted out.

Captain Baughman states that the work done at Palouse rapids will now make the channel safe for navigation at any stage of water. This has long been considered one of the very dangerous places on the river. The river at this point has crowded into solid rock walls, the channel at points being only 70 feet wide, while the depth is 150 feet. There is nearly a mile of this kind of water. The work has been devoted to blasting out the dangerous projections, while at the lower approach of the rapids, the channel has been widened from 45 feet to 33. Captain Baughman says the extremely low stage of water has enabled some very good work to be done under most convenient circumstances. At points it was possible to operate the drills from the banks. Some big charges of powder have been used. A 950 pound shot resulted in blowing out a reef of rock 75 feet long and 15 feet wide.

Captain Baughman says that at Pine Tree rapid, 30 miles below Palouse rapids, splendid work is being done in improving the channel by Mr. McManagan, who is operating a drill soon removing rocks and reefs.

CATTLEMEN LOOKING TO GRAYS HARBOR

Aberdeen, Wash.—California cattlemen will shortly make a trip of inspection to this district, according to I. S. Shey, who has just returned from a 10 days' visit at San Francisco. "They figure," said Mr. Shey, "to buy all the logged-off land available, if this district shall be found suitable for their purpose, dairying. They routed me out of my room at the St. Francis one night and asked me all kinds of questions concerning this country.

"They represented some of the largest and wealthiest cattlemen in California. They have plenty of money and are seeking no assistance financially. All they want is to obtain land at reasonable prices. They think that they can overcome the winter rains by the construction of extensive shelters. They said that they had heard a great deal of the harbor country, and that judging by what they had heard, it would be admirably suited for a stock and dairy country. "Curiously enough, one of the things that made them view this district with favor was the heavy rainfall. They said it was good for sheep and besides they declared that the ranges of California had become too dry for the raising of food meat. Another advantage in favor of the harbor is its excellent shipping facilities."

RAISE CHINESE VEGETABLES NOW IN WALLA WALLA

Walla Walla, Wash.—The Chinese gardeners and there are about 400 of them on the tracts near this city, have taken to raising oriental products for the oriental trade. The Celestials so far have contented themselves with bringing forth cabbages and cauliflower and onions and such, and they have disposed of these crops through the city, making a house to house canvass. They now propose to raise also some of the dainty things they used to get on the Yang Tse Kiang and incidentally export to other parts of the northwest some of these good things for the use of their hungry and nostalgic compatriots. This is the first season the Chinese vegetable business has been tried. The chief articles of diet so far produced are a Chinese squash that is about the size of a small cantaloupe and looks like a cross between a cucumber and a watermelon. It is white inside. The Chinese say it makes excellent soup. The other triumph of oriental agriculture is a Chinese cucumber. It has a hard, crinkly outside and a peppery taste. It is said to be the outcome of crossing cucumbers and peppers and is also said to be a delightful refreshment when properly prepared.
