THEODORE JR. AND WIFE ARE SNUBBED

SOCIAL HIGHBRUPS VENT WHAMP UPON YOUNG T. R.

Though They Are Related, the Mighty Crocker Snub T. R. Jr., and Bride Through Political Animosity—Son of Successful One Hobnobs With Insurgents.

San Francisco.—Theodore Roosevelt Jr. and his bride, who have made San Francisco their home, are beginning to be made to feel that all is not milk and honey in the social life in the city by the Golden Gate. Society generally is busy gossiping about the snub offered to Mr. and Mrs. Teddy Jr. by the William H. Crocker, who failed to include them in their list of guests invited to the debut of Miss Ethel Crocker at Hillsborough last week. The slight is all the more marked, the gossip says, because Mrs. Roosevelt is a niece of Mrs. Charles B. Alexander of New York, who was Harriet Crocker, sister of the local banker.

As a matter of fact, it has become common knowledge in San Francisco that that portion of the four hundred who have been aligned on the side of Patrick Calhoun and the anti-graft prosecution forces, has taken umbrage at the friendship displayed by the son of the ex-president for Rudolph Spreckles, who, with Francis J. Heney led the fight against the grafters. The young couple have rented one of the Spreckles houses on Pacific avenue and are frequently visitors at the home of the millionaire reformer, which adjoins the house they occupy.

Moreover, on the night of the primary election young Teddy was an enthusiastic member of the party that gathered at the headquarters of Hiram Johnson, insurgent candidate for governor, and was the first to congratulate Johnson when the early returns indicated his overwhelming victory.

Again, the William H. Crocker and their immediate circle in the smart set are by no means in sympathy with the insurgent movement as typified by Colonel Roosevelt, and some of them have not hesitated to openly voice their disapprobation of anything that contributes to the defeat of the stand-patters. So far as the Crocker are concerned the feeling goes so far that when Mrs. Crocker recently returned from Europe with her daughter Ethel she did not attend the district attorney. It is terrible to think that a father would not help a son who has sinned.

"He must be punished. I have no sympathy for him," answered Dunne, as he left the court room.

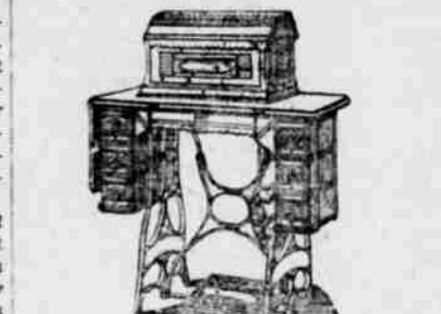

How to Prevent Smut in Wheat

During the past season a great deal of smut has developed in the wheat crop, which has caused serious loss to the growers. It not only causes a loss in yield but also in the selling price. It is safe to say that the grower of smutty wheat does not receive over half the profit from it that could come from clean wheat.

By carefully looking over the wheat field at maturing time, heads may be found which have been entirely destroyed. The wheat kernels have become nothing more than a black mass of spores. When the crop is threshed many of these spores cling to the grain and are carried back to the wheat field at seeding time. Soon after the wheat kernel germinates the smut spores also germinate. The germinated spore or fungus develops a thread-like structure which enters the wheat plant. This does not appear to damage the wheat plant very much during its growing period, but it is there, ready for work, as soon as the wheat heads appear.

There are two kinds of wheat smut, loose smut and stinking smut. Both can be prevented by treating the seed and rotting the crops. The spores of both kinds of smut are carried by the seed, but the spores of loose smut may also be carried in the soil from one year to another. Treating the seed prevents stinking smut, but loose smut requires that the seed be treated and that the ground on which it grew be planted to another crop the following year. The stinking smut is the kind most commonly found; it destroys the kernels only, while the loose smut destroys the grain and chaf entirely and the stinky mass of spores remain. The stinking smut gives off an offensive odor, when broken.

The following "formalin treatment" will prevent stinking smut in wheat also the smuts which commonly affect barley and oats:

Formalin Treatment—There are several methods of treatment: Hot water treatment, blue stone treatment and formalin treatment, the last of which is safest, most reliable and the cheapest.

Secure a 40 per cent solution of formalin at a reliable drug store. One pound of formalin is sufficient to treat from 2000 to 2500 pounds of wheat. Before mixing the solution, get the seed wheat ready. The treating solution is made by carefully mixing a one-pound bottle of formalin with forty gallons of water.

The seed may be treated by dipping or sprinkling. To dip, the seed may be placed on a gunny sack and the solution in a barrel or tank. The wheat should be immersed in this for at least ten minutes and then taken out and allowed to drain back into the barrel for a short time. The wheat should then be emptied into a pile in a clean place and covered with sacks or blankets for two hours, after which it should be thoroughly dried before sowing.

treating, as the germinating qualities may be injured.
Place the dried wheat in sacks which have been dipped in the solution. It is also advisable to sprinkle the grain with the solution before using it. Exercise every precaution not to bring the treated seed in contact with any that has not been treated or in bins which have contained smut wheat. The wheat should be treated but a short time before sowing it.—Forthworth Citizen-Star.

WHITMAN FOOTBALL TEAM WILL PLAY FOUR GAMES

Walla Walla, Wash.—Four intercollegiate football games will be played by the Whitman team this year, the arrangements now pending with the University of Washington are completed. Two of the games will be held here and two away from home. Manager Harold Crawford now has his schedule practically completed and the dates fixed.

Preliminary games will be played with the Walla Walla high school, Columbia Junior college of Milton, Watsburg high school and others that can be arranged for. This early in the season schedule is for the purpose of trying out the new plays and the management is in hopes that these games played at home will arouse interest to keep up the game the rest of the season in good shape.

The first intercollegiate contest will be played with the University of Washington in Seattle October 22, if the arrangements now pending with the university are completed. Oregon Agricultural college is the next on the list, that game to be played in Corvallis, November 5.

The home schedule begins with the game with the University of Idaho, which is dated November 12. The final game, with the Washington state college, will be played here Thanksgiving, November 24.

The playing of the Thanksgiving game here goes back to the old custom when all the Thanksgiving games were played in Walla Walla. Pullman, however, decided about six years ago that the games should alternate and consequently three Thanksgiving contests were decided in that place. This year is again the turn of Pullman to have the game, but the management, realizing the better chances for a crowd here, decided to let Walla Walla take another turn at the Turkey day match.
