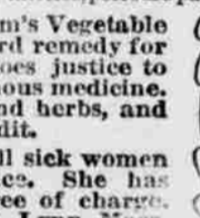

THE WHEAT MARKET

ADVANCE FAILS TO BRING OUT WHEAT

Chicago Market Higher at Both Opening and Close; Liverpool Gains Late.

Chicago, Sept. 20.—Wheat advanced 3-8 to 1-2c at the opening and closed 1-2 to 3-4c a bushel higher than yesterday.

There was little wheat for sale at the opening this morning and even the higher prices failed to attract sellers. Trading was bullish all day in consequence and the closing was among the best prices for the season.

Foreign wheat markets were mixed. Liverpool opened unchanged and closed 1 3-8 higher than yesterday. Antwerp closed unchanged, Berlin 7-8 higher and Budapest 5-8 lower.
