

CATTLE MARKET IS GLUTTED BY BIG RUN

RECORD BREAKING RUN OF LIVESTOCK IN YARDS

Thirty-six Cars of Cattle Came Forward from Local Points — Heavy Shipment of Hogs Arrive from Nebraska.

Portland, Oct. 3.—Thirty-six cars of cattle came into the local yards over Sunday, this being the greatest run for a similar period ever shown here.

Along with the big run of cattle during the day there was a heavy supply of hogs unloaded. Twelve cars came from Nebraska alone, and over Sunday a total of 1250 head were received.

The hog trade here, and especially the smaller butchers, are exercised over the alleged attempt to force them to pay unprofitable prices for swine, while the big fellows bring in hogs from Nebraska that cost them much less money.

For instance, the extreme top of the hog market today at South Omaha, Nebraska, is \$5.70. This would make these hogs cost \$9.35 to land at Portland, or other Pacific coast points. By bidding up a few head at \$10.25 or even better, the small butchers allege that they are forced to pay extreme high values on the few swine they are forced to buy.

Cattle Prices Too Low Here.

While hog prices are higher here than hogs can be bought for at Nebraska points and shipped here, the price of cattle is out of line especially for the better quality. While local interests are paying full limits for cows as compared with values obtainable in South Omaha or other central west markets, steers here should be selling today on the basis of \$5.35 for best stuff, considering the height of that market elsewhere.

Best steers sold today at South Omaha around \$7.50 and therefore stuff of equal quality could be shipped from here and net the shipper a handsome return on the basis of present values.

Kidwell & Caswell were the big shippers of cattle this week, their supplies for the day totaling 17 cars, 14 of which were sent from Baker City.

WHEAT ERRATIC IN THE CHICAGO PIT

Chicago, Oct. 3.—Wheat was mixed all day. It started mixed and closed in a similar plight. Closing was 3-4c lower for December, 5-8c lower for May and 1-2c higher for the July option. Liverpool presented a bold front today and after opening 3-8 to 1-2d higher, closed with an advance of 7-8 to 1d above Saturday. At Berlin there was a rise of 1 1-2c and at Budapest 1c. The increase of over 2,500,000 bushels in the visible supply of wheat caused some selling of the December option and at the start it was unchanged from Saturday. It closed 3-4c lower. While the May was 1-4c higher at the opening, due to short covering the close was extremely weak and 5-8 above Saturday.
