LISBON FALLS BEFORE ATTACK

Sudden Onslaught of Revolutionary Party Disconcerts Royalists.

KING MANUEL IS SAFE ON BRAZILIAN WARSHIP

Republican Forces Make Sudden Attack by Land and Sea on Portugese Capital and Braganza Dynasty is Doomed-Fierce Fighting Reported in Outlying Provinces—Disorder May Spread Into Spain.

Badajor, Spain, via Portugal Frontier, Oct. 5 .- A Republican provisional government patterned after the government of Brazil is in control of Portugal today, according to refugees arriving here from Lisbon. Almost without warning yesterday the revolution started. A battleship fired on the royal palace while the revolutionists on land armed for the conflict. Lisbon fell and with it passed cations. Reports this afternoon say the palace still resists the attack.

The revolution is having an effect

in Spain. Outlying provinces show unrest and it is feared this may spread throughout the whole peninsu-

If the king has escaped, he owes his safety to the valor of his bodyguard. Refugees assert the guard barricaded the entrance to the palace and prevented the capture of the king by an army many times stronger. Spain Is Warned.

San Sebastine, Spain, Oct. 5 .- Officers of the northern army corps are reported to have received telegraphic order to prepare immediately for active service. The order is taken to indicate Spanish officials had advance information of the Portuguese rebellion and are preparing to put down a like rebellion in Spain by the most drastic measures.
