

SHAKY FEELING IN THE CATTLE MARKET

UNEASINESS CAUSED BY THE PREVAILING PRICES

Shippers Are Scared Because of the Lower Level Here Than in East—Poor Lambs Sell at Fair Values.

Portland, Oct. 4.—There was only a handful of livestock shipments to the local market today, but the trade was in no mood to receive additional supplies. The market for good steers is generally at \$5.25, and it took exceedingly good cattle to bring this price. One load averaging 1156 pounds went at \$5.50.

Shippers and stock raisers of the interior have become frightened at the way cattle values have dropped and all are looking for an escape from the present situation. The fact that eastern markets continue to pay high prices for cattle gives them some hope and there is a possibility that local killers will be forced into line after a while.

Other lines of livestock show no change for the day.

I. G. Wright was the only arrival with live stock since yesterday's report. He had a mixed load of cattle, calves and sheep on this morning's market.

Comparative Livestock Prices.

On the basis of prices obtainable today for best steers at South Omaha the market is nearly a dollar too low at this time. For instance best steers are selling in the Nebraska yards up to \$7.50 today while the best price here is \$5.50 and only one load sold at that figure; the bulk of the business in good stuff being around \$5.25.

On the basis of South Omaha prices hogs are too high here and only the small killers are forced to buy locally. In Nebraska today the best hogs are quoted at \$8.75 which means \$9.85 to land here. Recent sales in the Portland yards were as high as \$10.25. Practically all the supplies of swine used by provision packers at this time are from Nebraska.

THE WHEAT MARKET

WHEAT CLOSES UP EXCEPT FOR JULY

Chicago Not Aided by Cables But Closes With Advance of 1-8 for the Day.

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Wheat opened unchanged but closed 1-8c higher for this crop and 1-8c for the July.

There was fairly good buying of wheat after the opening, and while cables generally gave no encouragement to take hold of supplies, considerable covering was noted among short interests after the market got under way.

Liverpool opened 1-2d lower and closed unchanged to 1-4d below yesterday.

The big increase in the world's visible supply was the dominating influence abroad. Bradstreet's report of the visible shows:

Wheat—East of Rockies, increased 2,604,000 bushels; Europe and afloat, decreased 200,000 bushels; Canada, increased 3,884,000 bushels; total world's supply increased 6,288,000 bushels.

Corn—Increased 331,000 bushels.

Oats—Decreased 569,000 bushels.

Broomhall cabled that the European visible supplies of wheat had decreased 150,000 bushels. He reports generally favorable crop conditions abroad.

A good cash demand was reported both at Minneapolis and Winnipeg today.

RUSSIAN DRY FARMING EXPERT VISITS NORTHWEST

Spokane, Wash.—Dr. Theodore Kryshstofovich, assigned by the ministry of agriculture of Russia as a commissioner to study farm conditions in the United States, has come to Spokane to represent his country at the fifth Dry Farming Congress, at the close of which he will visit the grain and hay belts of the Northwestern and Pacific states. He expects to pass several weeks in Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Idaho, Montana and the Dakotas to study the growing of cereals, alfalfa and fruits and root crops.

"I came to Spokane direct from Buenos Ayres, making only a brief stop at St. Louis," he said. "I passed some time in Argentina, where I was sent on a special mission by my government. There I studied the methods of the farmer with a view to introducing some of them in our country. I also expect to find much useful material in this country. I have read in reports that your farmers are doing wonderful things on so-called dry and irrigated lands and I expect to learn much that will be of value to Russia."

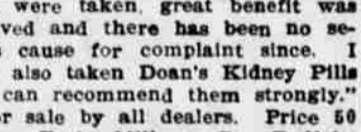
