 Hermiston, Ore., Oct. 10.—During the past few days a number of real estate sales have been reported, among which was a 20-acre tract to Dr. K. Paulson, a prominent Chicago physician. He plans to start improvement work at once, in the way of clearing, seeding and building house and barn. He also plans a commercial orchard and expects to have everything ready to start setting trees next spring. His brother, R. Paulson, was also a purchaser of a 20-acre tract north of Hermiston. BIBLE TRANSLATED IN HUNDREDS OF TONGUES

London.—The one hundred and sixth annual report of the British Foreign Bible society, just published, is an interesting document. The secretary's total issues for the last year were as follows: Bibles, 843,784; New Testaments, 1,198,226; portions, 4,578,014; total, 6,620,024. The result is 685,000 in excess of the output in the previous year and constitutes a record in the history of the society. The marked increase in the issues during the year just ended is chiefly due to the advance of Christianity in the Far East. More than 1,500,000 copies of the Scriptures went out to China, and of these nearly 99 per cent were sold, while 358,000 books were circulated in Korea and 305,000 in Japan. In India, including Burma and Ceylon, the circulation rose to 789,000. In South America, 155,000 copies and in Canada 148,000 copies were put into the hands of the people, while 1,415,000 copies were distributed in Continental Europe. The number of versions on the society's list has reached a total of 424 by the publication of the Gospels in six new languages during the past year. St. Matthew has been published in Ongom, the speech of a powerful Bantu tribe inhabiting the basin of the Gabun river, in French Congo. St. Matthew and St. John have been published in Namau, the speech of 40,000 cannibals on the south coast of British New Guinea. For two tribes in New Caledonia, St. Mark and St. John are printed in Houallou, and St. Mark in Ponerhouen. For the Colomon Islands, St. Matthew has been printed in Eiu, a dialect spoken in the island of Mwala, while St. Luke has been issued in Raga, spoken on Whitsuntide island in the New Berbides. For the subjects of the Emperor Menelik a complete New Testament has at last been published in Tigrinya, a Semitic language spoken by 3,000,444 people in the Tigre province, Abyssinia.

SON'S BODY MAY REST ALONGSIDE NAPOLEON'S

Paris.—If the French government can see its way clear to co-operate with the movement to place the remains of the young king of Rome by the side of those of his illustrious father in the Invalides, no one would demur. You have only to assist at the performance of the "Aiglon" to realize the profound sympathy of the French people for the unfortunate Duke de Reichstadt, who died at Schaenbrunn on July 22, 1832.

The logic of history alone would suggest that the proper place for the great emperor's son is the Invalides, and not the Church of the Capuchins at Vienna. They so loved each other and both died in exile in the common disaster. It may reasonably be supposed that Austria would not object to the transfer if the government of the republic desired it.

The Echo de Paris writes as if the thing were possible, and Mme. Severine pleads earnestly for the realization of a spectacle that would be at once pathetic and picturesque.

The republic is strong enough to bear the strain. Louis Philippe had much more to fear from a recrudescence of Bonapartism in 1840, and yet he had the coffin of Napoleon I brought over from St. Helena and placed where it now is.
