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NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

32 Bullets in Bear.

Eugene, Ore.—While at the duck preserves west of Eugene Sunday afternoon, armed only with a 32 caliber rifle with short cartridges, Dr. M. M. Bull, a local dentist, ran across a big brown bear which a hound had driven down from the hills, and which it had treed. The doctor fired 32 shots, all the cartridges he had and declares that every one hit the bear, but the small bullets with little force behind them had little effect, and the bear after the fusillade was over climbed down the tree, jumped into the Long Tom river and disappeared in the brush on the opposite side.

O. A. C. Star Injured.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis.—During the last few moments of scrimmage Tuesday night Enberg, the star fullback of the Oregon Agricultural college football team, sustained an injury which will keep him off the field for many weeks.

This accident is one of the worst things that could have happened to the team, as Coach Schildmiller has been building his team around the four men, Keck, Enberg, Hawley and Huntley.

It will be utterly impossible to replace Enberg, but there are several candidates who will be given a chance for the place. These men are Hastings, Asbahr, Sittin and Walters.

Train Jumper Is Insane.

Roseburg, Or.—William Booth, the young man who attempted to jump from a fast moving Southern Pacific train near Leland late Sunday night, and who was later taken into custody by the Glendale officers and brought to Roseburg, was adjudged insane by the county physician.

Although he carried over \$600 in travelers' checks, payable at the First National bank of Great Falls Montana, all telegrams sent to that city have been ignored, other than a reply from the cashier of the bank, who said he might have funds there, but he did not know. Local officers say they intend to investigate the case thoroughly that the money may be returned to his parents in the event they can be located.

Two-bit Fight Costs \$150.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Dispute over a 25-cent cab fare was the cause of breaking a \$150 plate glass window in the front of the Dacres Hotel and even now the fare remains unsettled and one of the belligerents, or both, must pay for the broken glass.

The trouble occurred when J. A. Bauman of Portland, superintendent of construction of the Baker building, rode from the O. R. & N. station to the Dacres Hotel in the cab driven by Frederick de Forest. Bauman tendered a return check given by the cab company, which for some reason the caddy refused. In the altercation that ensued Bauman threw De Forest across the walk and the cabman fell over a bench and into the window, through which he went. He was not hurt.

Team Accused of Theft.

Everett, Wash.—Following the departure of Snohomish high school football team from Stanwood and the discovery that several fine pictures of football scenes have disappeared from the walls of the Stanwood Hotel, where the team had stayed, a warrant for the arrest of the entire team, its coach and a high school teacher, who had accompanied it to Snohomish, was sworn out by Allan Bartz, proprietor of the hotel.

Telephone messages were sent to Everett and Snohomish, the sheriff here being informed of the issuance of the blanket warrant, with a request that the team be met and arrested.

The pictures were taken from the walls of the hotel, after a number of the visiting team of football players had requested them as a gift, and had been refused. Acting on advice from Stanwood, Everett officers met the train and detained the Snohomish players in the waiting room, where their belongings were searched and the stolen pictures were found.

Upon the promise of the team's coach that the property would be returned, the party was permitted to proceed to Snohomish.

AIR POST FOR MADAGASCAR.

Letters Will Be Delivered in Six Hours Instead of Eight Days.

Paris.—Flying postmen will probably be employed for the first time in Madagascar. M. Picquee, the governor-general of the island, is negotiating with the president of the French National Aerial League for the organization of an aeroplane mail service with as little delay as possible.

Antananarivo, the capital, is to be linked with towns situated as far as 250 miles distant, which can only be reached by letter at the present time in eight days. The same distance can be traversed by aeroplane in six hours.

The military commandant of Madagascar is now engaged with delegates of the league in studying the country to be crossed by the aerial letter carriers. As there is a great extent of tableland, suitable landing places will not be wanting.
