WHY NOT OBEY THE LAW?

Judge Gilliland, candidate for reelection as county judge has put forth the following over his signature:
"I was always a good fellow with the R. O. editor until I refused to allow that paper to publish the monthly statement of the expenses of the county, at a nice little sum, after the grand jury had recommended to the court that it was an unnecessary expense and should be stopped. Then I was a good fellow no longer."

That statement is absolutely false and uncalled for. It is a sample of gutter politics and is on a par with some other stories circulated in Judge Gilliland's behalf during this campaign.

The statement made is an insinuation that this paper is opposing Judge Gilliland for selfish and sordid reasons. Were the East Oregonian influenced by such considerations in the judgeship campaign this paper would be supporting Judge Gilliland instead of Mr. Maloney. This paper gets the county printing now. It publishes the official notices for the county and does job work for the county. But it gets that business upon a business basis and not through any political deal. The fact that this paper gets business from the county and may or may not get such business in the future is not influencing the views of the editor in this campaign. When this paper supports a candidate for office it supports him upon his merits. It is supporting J. W. Maloney for county judge because it believes him more qualified for the job than is the present incumbent.

But now that Judge Gilliland has brought up the question of publishing the county expenses a word or two upon that subject is in order. Under a state law it is required that the county court publish in a newspaper a statement of the detailed expenses of the county. It is a good law and the purpose of the law is to let taxpayers know for what purpose the county money is being expended.

But that law has not been obeyed by the county court. Several years ago the court was sharply criticized for not obeying the law. Thereupon the court proceeded to publish the expenses for a short time. Then publication was dropped on the pretext that a grand jury had objected to the expense as needless. It was a shallow pretext. No grand jury has the semblance of authority to annul a state law. The fact that a grand jury was induced to take such action does not excuse the court at all. It would be cheap pettifoggery to claim the contrary.

The county court should publish a statement of the expenses of this county. Not only because the law requires this but because taxpayers are entitled to know how their money is spent. This year the county is expending over \$400,000. The plea that a county that has such a heavy busi-

ness as this cannot afford to spend a few dollars to let people know where the money goes is absurd. No sane man will accept that plea. When the court refuses to publish an expense statement as required by law the natural inference is that the court does not wish its work made known. As a matter of fact this very inference is now being drawn by hundreds of taxpayers and the fact is hurting Judge Gilliland's candidacy.

LEADERS VS. BOSSES.

At the New York republican convention held at Saratoga recently Theodore Roosevelt gave expression to a sentiment that deserves repetition in every town in the union.

"The leader leads, the boss drives. The leader holds his place by firing the conscience and appealing to the reason of his fellow men, and the boss holds his place by crooked and underhanded manipulation."

This declaration was made by Roosevelt when he was engaged in life and death battle with the "old guard." The old contingent was controlled by bosses. Roosevelt is a leader and his leadership was sufficient to overthrow the political machinery of the republican party in the empire state.

Commenting recently upon Roosevelt's utterance and its wide significance the Spokesman-Review said:

"The boss drives from his seat of crooked and underhanded manipulation, the leader leads from the flaming chariot of enlightened principles and sincere devotion to the cause of man."

"It is the cleavage of the forces of light and darkness in the political life of America today, and it was no more apparent in that hall in Saratoga than it is in every political gathering in the United States."

"There are in fact the two dominant parties in the country today. Boss Woodruff and Boss Barnes and 'Hot-Shot' Gruber, who stood before that blast of censure, were more distantly removed politically from Colonel Roosevelt and his followers than many members of the democratic or peoples or independent parties who, though differing on some minor political details, agree with Colonel Roosevelt on the basic principles of uncompromising honesty and fair dealing."

"Two very simple words, in fact, right and wrong, define the differences between the main political beliefs of today; and in a happy phrase Mr. Roosevelt struck this as the key note of the occasion. The boss drives for his selfish interests, the leader leads for the interest of his fellowmen."

Whereupon the first minor poet gurgled. "Why," said he, "she wanted to know whether I had written it."

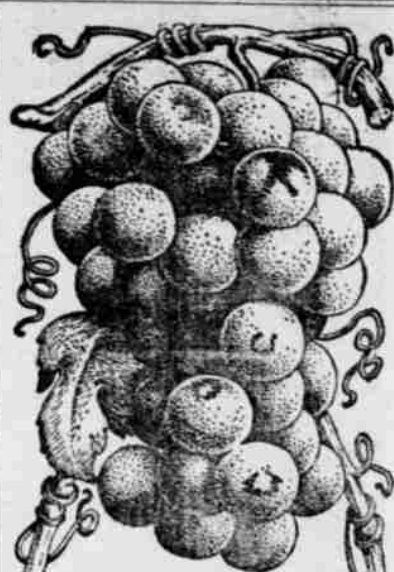
Good Reason.

A kind local lady went to Columbus last week to distribute helpful literature to the convicts in the penitentiary.

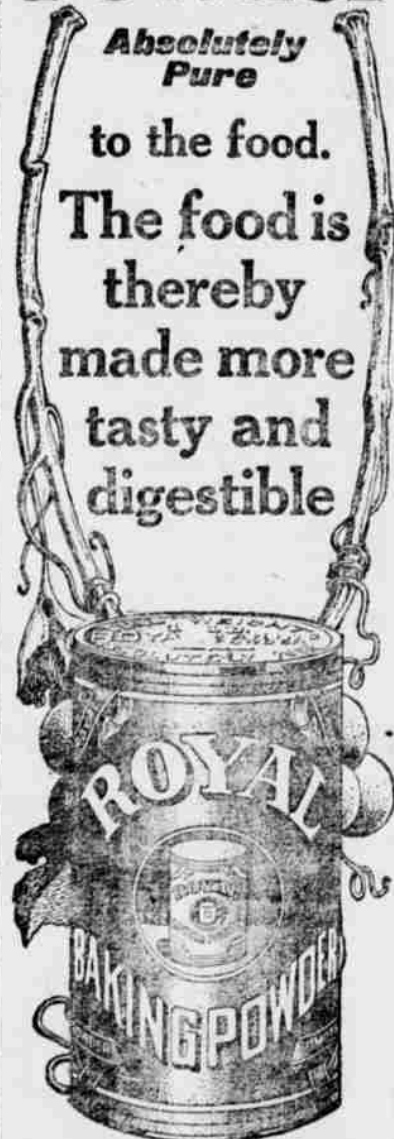
"What are you in for, my poor fellow?" she inquired of the first prisoner she saw.
