ABOVE \$5.25 MARK

Best Hogs Sell at \$10-Sheep Prices Shaded and Yearling Wethers at

Portland, Ore., Oct. 14.—Recent sales of sheep and lambs in the local market have been made at lower prices. Best wethers are quoted today at \$4, with yearlings at \$4.25. Ewes are selling top at \$3.50, but most lots range around \$3 and \$3.25, according to quality. Lambs are extreme top at \$5.25, and it takes very best quality to bring this. Lambs have been sold recently as low as \$4.50 for poor qual-

While top steers are still holding at \$5.50, few sales are made above \$5.25 in the Portland yards. This is due, not to any lack of demand for higher priced goods, but to the lack of offerings sufficiently good to bring the top quotations.

There was only a small run of livestock in the yards today. Chief among the features was two loads of goats from Dallas. Owing to the extreme high prices recently quoted for meats, goats are passing into consumption

RUSSIAN INSPECTION LAX,

Government Takes No Precautions to Prevent Sprend of Plague.

St Petersburg.-The disgust and impatience felt here and daily expressed in the newspapers, at the half hearted and ineffectual attempts of the authorities to stamp out the cholera, have been considerably increased by the discovery that vessels loaded with grain from Odessa, where there is plague as well as cholera, are out any medical inspection or san-

itary precautions whatever. Such a vessel has been discharging Odessa grain on the quays of the Neurally brought with it some of the rats of Odessa, which are being officially exterminated as far as possible in the latter town, in order to prevent the spread of the infection.


