LIVESTOCK RUNS ARE ENORMOUS

SHARP DECLINE IN HOGS IS RECORDED

Fifteen Loads Swine From Nebraska for Local Packers—Cattle and Sheep Supplies Are Very Heavy.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 17.—Hogs dropped from 25c to 30c in the North Portland stockyards this afternoon for local stuff on account of the high importations of eastern stock by local packers.

One bull that weighed 1640 pounds sold at \$4, but the animal was very fat. Sheep market is weaker and about 10c lower, but lambs sold at \$5.25 for eastern Washington stock.

Portland is today dependent upon Nebraska and the middle west for all its swine supplies. More carloads of hogs are being received here each succeeding week. Today's arrivals were 15 cars; the greatest number ever sent here at one time from the Omaha territory.

Owing to the huge arrivals from the east there was a tendency to sidestep the arrivals from local points today. Five full loads of hogs came from northwest points over Sunday, but these were scarcely looked at during the morning.

Big packers seem more than ever determined to put Portland on an eastern basis.

There was a very heavy supply of cattle in the yards over Sunday. Twenty-seven loads of cattle were unloaded during the day, 12 of these being from one party and nine cars from another. The bulk of the arrivals were rather late, and therefore trade was slow during the early part of the day.

There were likewise very heavy shipments of sheep to the Portland yards today, a total of 1248 head being received. Best eastern Washington lambs sold at \$5.50, while some ewes sold around \$3.50.

THE WHEAT MARKET

CLOSING OF WHEAT MARKET IS LOWER

Chicago Ends With Loss of .7-8 to 1 3-8; Heavy World's Shipments Again.

Chicago, Oct. 17.—Wheat market here and abroad was influenced by the increase in the visible supply and the heavy world's shipments of wheat.

Cables were of a nature to inspire a little confidence among the bulls that was the reason why opinions were divided here at the start. While the closing was 7-8c to 1 1-2c a bushel lower, opening values were 1-8c higher for December, unchanged for the May and 1-2c lower for July.

World's shipments of wheat, according to Broomhall, were 13,392,000 bushels. Russian wheat, 5,240,000 bushels; Danuban, 3,140,000 bushels.
