### RHODES SCHOLARSHIP EXAMS AT OREGON

Eugene, Ore.—Qualifying examinations for the Rhodes Scholarship will be held at the University of Oregon on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 25 and 26. The examination subjects include arithmetic, Algebra and Geometry, Latin and Greek grammar, and translations into English from Latin and Greek.  
 The examination questions are sent out from Oxford University, and to qualify for the scholarship one must pass the examinations and at the time of taking them must not be over twenty-four years of age. The scholar is not selected, however, by the Rhodes Scholarship or the Oxford University authorities. The selection of a scholar to represent the state is done by a committee of five of the presidents of colleges in the state. The Oregon scholarship committee consists of President Campbell of the University of Oregon, chairman; President Ferrin, Pacific University;

President Riley, McMinnville College; and President Homan, Williamette University. The committee in consultation awards the scholarship to the most likely promising candidate.

The Rhodes scholarships are the result of a bequest made by Cecil Rhodes, the great English and South African financier, just before his death, his idea being to promote the peace of the world by a better understanding and sympathy between nations through education. Two scholars are sent to Oxford University, England, from each of the states every three years. The scholarships each are worth \$1500 a year, and carry for three years. Out of this amount it seems that a scholar should be able to save something, but British customs which must be adhered to demand a certain expenditure for things which can not be evaded, even though they are obnoxious to American principles. For instance, each scholar who takes up residence at Oxford must conform to the custom of having an individual servant, called a "fag" who also does the work of a valet. A scholar, from all his expenses, can manage to save just about enough for a trip on the continent each year.

Oregon has two scholars in residence now at Oxford, both from the University of Oregon: Wistar Johnson, who is in his last year, and Cecil Lyana, in his first year.

In the past there has been a scarcity of applicants for scholarships from Oregon, never more than a half dozen candidates presenting themselves for examination. From present indications, the number will not exceed five this year. Any person who desires to qualify should notify soon the president of the university.
