NEWS FROM ALASKAN CAMPS.

Several Important New Strikes Reported From the North.

The excellent monthly summary of progress in Alaska, published by the Alaska-Yukon Magazine this month optismistic. It says: "News of new gold strikes in several districts of the territory sounds a hopeful note in the events of the summer season. It is the fulfillment of many confident predictions and its effect seems certain to be a widely increased area of prospecting and another rise of production. This season's Alaska gold output will bring the grand to-tal up to \$180,000,000, and it is almost certain that in 1911 the twohundred million mark will be passed It is not too much to hope, in view of present developments, the next year's production will be larger than that of the banner year of 1906 when \$22,000,000 was sent out.


