Brings Cattle From John Day.

Constructing New Sidewalk.  
Nearly 200 feet of new sidewalk is being constructed along the south side of Main street and between Bluff and High streets. The building of the walk was made necessary by the dangerous condition of the old and was ordered by the city council.

An engine with two coaches therefore arrived in Pendleton at 12:20 and returning will leave on the regular motor schedule at 4:35.

New Assistant Superintendent.  
W. H. Jaekle is the name of the new assistant superintendent of the O. R. & N., having been named to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of H. J. A. Lonergan. His position corresponds to that formerly known as division engineer. Lonergan has been assistant superintendent for more than a year, having succeeded Stotler who followed Berkeley, now with the Oregon & Washington.

Steel Gang Is Here.  
The steel gang of the O. R. & N. is here for the purpose of erecting the new steel water tank at the site of the new well by the side of the new roundhouse on Bluff street. The steam engine which is being used to pump the water and hoist the dirt from the new well is also to be used to lift the heavy part of the steel tank into place. Bedrock has now been reached in the well. The gravel is being cleared from this and then a basin, ten feet deep, will be blasted out of the solid rock to hold the water.

### MURPHY TO ATTEND MEETING OF CITIES

Mayor E. J. Murphy will represent the city of Pendleton at the annual convention of the League of California Municipalities to be held in San Diego, California, November 15 to 19 inclusive. At last night's meeting of the council the mayor was named as delegate and an appropriation of \$200 was made to defray his expenses.

This will be the most important meeting of the kind ever held on the coast and the members of the council were of the opinion that the knowledge gained from having a representative at the meeting would enable them to save to the city many times the cost of sending a delegate. In addition to many important questions relative to city administration which will be discussed there will be an exposition of municipal machinery and supplies. The economical administration of city affairs will be the keynote of the convention.

Mayor Murphy and Councilmen Stroble, Dyer, Sharon, Brock and Ell were present at last night's meeting. The salary list was read and ordered paid, the city attorney was instructed to notify the Northern Pacific railroad company to improve its Main street crossing and the meeting was adjourned.

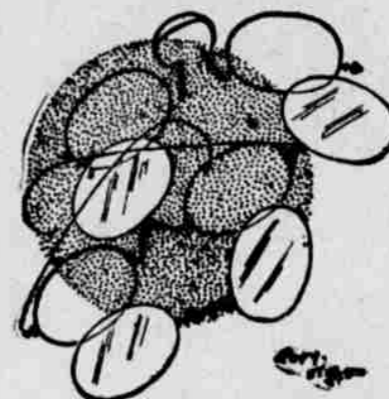
