London, Nov. 3 .- The Spanish cauldron of revolt is seething today and despite the strictest censorship of news, it is known that the revolutionary movement is spreading. A force of 20,000 soldiers has been added to the Madrid garrison and also the forts at Barcelona and Sabadel have been augmented with the pick of the loyal-ist troops. Military and police are provided with rapid fire guns. The long predicted strike among the workmen has begun, starting at Barcelons and is spreading. A thousand labor-ers are already idle. Paris, Nov. 3.-Representatives of the Spanish Republican society prediet that Madrid and other Spanish cities will be in the hands of the revo-lutionists before tomorrow night. They allege they have received secret advices telling of the success of the rev-olutionary movement and the desertion of the army to the republican cause. Reports are current that Don Jaimie, the Carlist pretender, has taken a hand in the movement.


