WORLD WAITS IN SUSPENSE

Meagre Reports From Spain Indicate That Revolution is Spreading.

RUMORED THAT KING ALFONSO IS KILLED

Impossible to Secure Any Confirmatory News, But Little Credit is Given—Garrisons Are Strengthened in Spanish Cities—England Sends Fleets to Nearby Ports—Don Jaime Reported Implicated.

London, Nov. 3.—The Spanish caudron of revolt is seething today and despite the strictest censorship of news, it is known that the revolutionary movement is spreading. A force of 20,000 soldiers has been added to the Madrid garrison and also the forts at Barcelona and Sabadel have been augmented with the pick of the loyalist troops.

Predict Success. Paris, Nov. 3.—Representatives of the Spanish Republican society predict that Madrid and other Spanish cities will be in the hands of the revolutionists before tomorrow night.

JAPANESE EMPEROR CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

Tokio, Nov. 3.—His Imperial Highness Mutsu Hito, mikado of Japan for more than two score years and who has guided the destinies of the country during a period of the most rapid national progress in the history of the world, is today celebrating his fifty-eighth birthday.

As usual on Nov. 3, all banks, schools and important business houses remain closed today, and the national flag floated from practically every house throughout the length and breadth of the land.

BALLINGER WITHDRAWS MORE OREGON LAND

Washington, Nov. 3.—All land lying within the Warm Springs Indian reservation, Oregon, bordering on the Deschutes and Metrolitus rivers, and extending back there from a quarter of a mile, were withdrawn by Secretary Ballinger for possible water power development.

HONDURAS AGAIN SCENE OF STRIFE

Washington, Nov. 3.—Advices that martial law has been declared in Honduras were received by the state department today from Commander Hayes of the gunboat Princeton.

It is believed this declaration of Valladares as an enemy of Honduras opens the way for the United States to attempt his dislodgment.

Valladares Wine Again. San Salvador, Nov. 3.—After defying President Davilla of Honduras and the civil authorities, Commandant Valladares who ran amuck recently and drove foreigners from Amapala, is reported today to have defeated a detachment of government troops sent against him.

DENIES U. S. WOULD ANNEX PANAMA

Washington, Nov. 3.—Published reports that President Taft's visit to Panama in November foreshadows the annexation of Panama by the United States were denied today by C. C. Arosemen, minister from Panama to the United States.

What Is the Reason? Washington, Nov. 3.—It is reported that Taft's trip is for one of two purposes—either annexation of Panama or extension of the canal zone to twenty-five miles either side of the canal.

SALEM RESIDENT IS FOULY MURDERED

J. E. ROBERTS SLAIN AND ROBBED OF \$5000

Salem, Ore., Nov. 3.—A determined search was begun today for the slayer of J. E. Roberts, a real estate man who was shot and killed and robbed of approximately \$5,000 on the bridge near the reform school last night while he was driving to the home of his brother to pay off the debt on his farm.

CANADA AND U. S. WILL DISCUSS RECIPROcity

Fielding and William Patterson will represent Canada, while Charles Pepper and Henry Hoyt, the former Controller of the Washington state department and the latter consul general will act for the United States.

COMMISSIONER KEEFE TO PROBE ALLEGED PEONAGE

Washington, Nov. 3.—Commissioner of Immigration Keefe will leave Washington today on an extensive tour, having for his object an investigation of the charges that labor troubles in the Hawaiian islands are caused by a system of peonage in violation of the federal constitution.

DIX THUNDERS AT ROOSEVELT

Democratic Candidate for Governor of New York Denounces Colonel.

CHARGES COLONEL MADE ALLIANCE WITH HEARST

In First Speech of His Campaign, John A. Dix Hurls Accusations at Head of Ex-President—Says Whole Nation Has Occasion to Blush at Roosevelt's Actions—Says He Merits Only Pity of Decent Men.

On Board the Roosevelt Special, Alliance, Ohio, Nov. 3.—"Dix becomes extremely valorous about me the moment I leave the state," said Colonel Roosevelt today, referring to the statements by John A. Dix, the democratic candidate for governor, in his first address in New York, in which he charged Roosevelt with wilful falsehood and misrepresentation.

Occasion to Blush. "Never," he said, "have we had so much occasion to blush for the conduct of a man who had been the first citizen of our country."

"Search all through the history of our country—examine and study the characters and careers of all those who have been chosen to fill this greatest of human positions—and where shall we find in all the long line of men who have stood forth in their day and generation—each as the foremost American citizen—where shall we find a man whose qualities, whose conduct, whose career after leaving office have been so lacking in dignity and self-respect?"

"Look for a moment upon the man who is now running up and down the state shouting, threatening, abusing and wilfully misrepresenting—bringing contempt and ridicule upon the great office he has held and avoiding the discussion of all the real issues of this campaign and then upon his great predecessors who never forgot what they owed to their country or the duty of bearing themselves always with dignity and with honor."

"Let his friends take which ever horn of the dilemma suits their efforts and his vanity to choose; my opponent's nominator either shamefully and shamelessly belied a fellow citizen when he had Mr. Root make the Utica speech of 1906, or he now deserves the condemnation of self respecting men in making an alliance with one but for whom, if we believe his own charges, President McKinley might have lived to serve out his elected term of office, and my opponent's nominator might never have been."

"I asked this man last week for the apology which one man owes another for even involuntary misrepresentation. His answer has been to repeat and I now charge wilfully and knowingly to repeat in so many places and to so many people as his voice would carry, the statements which I now publicly brand as false."

"I withdrew my request for an apology and I say with all the emphasis at my command that a man who has been president of the United States who would do the things which he has done, during this campaign, merits only the pity of decent men."

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
