

SHEEP MARKET MAKES ADVANCE

MIXED SHEEP AT \$5 IN PORTLAND YARDS

Run is heavy but buyers take hold because of recent decrease in offerings—all lines in big supply.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 3.—Even with a heavy run in the yards today there was an advance of about 25c in the price of sheep today. This was the first real liberal run the yards at North Portland have shown for some time; therefore the trade was in excellent condition for their reception. Hog run was heavy, and all shipments came from Pacific northwest points. A total of 602 head was received for the day compared with 461 head a week ago.

There was a further advance of a dime at South Omaha for hogs today. This put the top price there to \$5.65, which would mean that it costs \$9.75 to land these supplies at Pacific northwest packing centers.

Cattle showing for the day was the greatest for the week, totaling 480 head.

Chicago Market Starts Higher But Closes With Bad Loss; Liverpool Is Up.

Foreign Wheat Cargoes.
Liverpool, Nov. 3.—Cargoes dull an inactive; buyers and sellers apart. Walla Walla, 35s and 25s 6d.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—Bull activity this morning gave way to extreme bearishness. Result, a loss of 1 1-8c to 2c a bushel from yesterday's closing price of wheat.

This market started unchanged for the December but 1-8c to 1-4c higher for the May and July options respectively. To bring about the bullishness of the morning there was a higher range abroad. Liverpool started 3-8d higher and closed 3-8d above yesterday.

Only for a brief period was there any bullishness displayed in the wheat trade today, and that was at the start. A small amount of short covering was induced by the changed attitude of Liverpool traders, but the action of the latter was probably due to the advanced prices here yesterday.

After the opening the market began to sag, and considerable weakness developed during the early part of the day. Closing was extremely weak and depressed.
