

# ENORMOUS RUN OF LIVESTOCK IN YARDS

LARGE RECEIPTS IN ALL LINES RECORDED

Arrivals Are Among the Heaviest Ever Received Here and Market Starts Rather Slowly Yesterday Morning.

Portland, Nov. 10.—Today's run of livestock in the yards was one of the greatest ever shown in this city. A total of 706 hogs, 986 cattle and 888 sheep arriving during the 24 hours.

Owing to the high showing, business started rather slowly this morning and during the early trading there was practically no change in general conditions.

TO STOP SALE OF ABSINTHE Swiss Government Will Halt Manufacture and Importation.

Geneva.—The suppression of the traffic in absinthe in Switzerland has begun. The law prohibiting its manufacture, sale and importation, which had been passed by both the federal chambers after the demand had expired has become operative.

It prohibits not only absinthe which is comprehensively defined—but all liquors resembling it in certain characteristics, and containing certain proportions of special essential oils. The law is to be carried out by the cantonal authorities, who will report annually to the federal government, and so Switzerland is freed from the baleful effects of the most pernicious of alcoholic liquors.

## THE WHEAT MARKET

### SHORT COVERING A VERY GOOD FACTOR

Chicago Wheat Market Closes 1-1/2 to 1-7/8c Above Yesterday's Prices.

Chicago, Nov. 10.—Short covering lifted the price of wheat here after a stubborn fight. Closing was 1-1/2c to 1-7/8c a bushel higher than yesterday.

At the first quotations the market for wheat was taken off this dip by some shorts to cover their sales. As the volume of covering expanded, there was a corresponding increase of strength and prices advanced sharply. The greatest advance was made just previous to the closing, when December advanced to 90 1/4c, where it closed. May went to 96 3/8c and only closed a fraction lower, while the July went to the high mark at 94 1/4c. It closed at the same figure.

Weakness abroad was directly responsible for the lower opening here today. At Liverpool there was an opening loss of 3-8d to 1-2d and a closing 1-8d to 1-4d under yesterday.

### TRADE IN INDIA IS GAINING IN VOLUME

Calcutta.—A review of the trade of India, written by C. W. E. Cotton, officiating director-general of commercial intelligence, shows in almost every respect an appreciable advance upon the previous year. It declares that:

India, after an unusually prolonged period of trade sickness, may be regarded as almost convalescent. As regards the future, present conditions auger further trade improvement in Europe and America in the next 12 months, but for India the restoration of industrial activity and the development of those internal exchanges which have been so conspicuously in defect during the last three years, can only be assured by a continuance of general agricultural prosperity.

The revival of trade, consequent on the favorable agricultural outlook, continues to be reflected in the revenue returns, which are already appreciably ahead of the estimates and promise a considerable surplus, provided that no setback occurs. A bumper cotton crop is anticipated, while jute, rice, seeds, and tea promise very active business.
