

BIG RUN OF SHEEP IS QUICKLY TAKEN

ABSORBED BY LOCAL TRADE AT TOP VALUES

Yesterday's Arrivals Total 933 Head in Addition to 888 Thursday—No Swine Appear in Market.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 11.—A heavy run of sheep was offering in the yards today and sales brought forth top values. Today's big run in addition to the extensive showing of yesterday was quickly absorbed, indicating that the big people have been famishing for some time so far as sheep and lambs are concerned. Lambs sold up to \$5.50.

Few excellent cattles are now coming forward, but for these there appears a very liberal call. No hogs were shown in the yards today and the top price is nominally placed at \$9.50, the same as yesterday.

PARTIZANS OF IRISH HOME RULE UNITE London.—The latest and most important news in British politics is a movement to unite English, Irish Scotch and Welshmen who favor home rule. The proposition is being seriously urged.

The Anglesey Liberal association, recently unanimously adopted a resolution in favor of federal home rule and called upon the Welsh members to co-operate with the Scottish Nationalists in promoting the movement have now communicated further on the matter with every liberal organization in Wales. The Welsh National Liberal council had a similar resolution on the calendar recently.

The covering letter of the secretary of the Anglesey association says: "I earnestly hope that you will bring this resolution to the notice of your association, and that your representatives will actively support the motion. An alliance between the Welsh and Scottish members will insure that Wales and Scotland will be placed on the same footing as Ireland as far as the question of revolution is concerned, while an alliance between the Welsh, Scottish and Irish members will make federal home rule for the four countries an issue second only in importance to the veto question. There never will be a more opportune time than the present for the bringing forward of the claims of Wales, as once home rule is granted to Ireland the inevitable result would be that Scotland and Wales would be more than ever before overshadowed by the power of the predominant partner in the councils of the nation. If we take

advantage of our opportunity and secure a measure of evolution for Wales we will be in a far more favorable position for dealing with the questions of disestablishment, licensing reform, education and the land than we are at present. On all these questions Wales is far in advance of England and she should be entitled to deal with them upon lines in accordance with the genius of the nation."
