ASYLUM GRANT STOPPED.

Clonmel District Lunatic Asylun Stands to Lose \$10,000 Yearly. Dublin -At a meeting of the committee of the Clonmel, district lunatic asylum the residential medical superintendent reported that the partial stoppage of the capitation grant to the asylum would result in a loss

of over \$10,000 a year. The committee approved of a proposal to promote a conference of asylum representaives in Ireland to secure full payment of the grant, The Kilkenny district asylum committee, who were informed that a sum of \$7900 had been deducted from the

grant in aid of pauper lunatics, requested the country council to take steps to secure the payment of the full grant. The clerk to the Sligo and Leitrim asylum announced that there had

been a total reduction of \$10,415 in the grants. A resolution was passed asking the government to provide for the full payment of the grants, was elected Lord Mayor of London The Gorccy district council passed

resolution of protest when informed that the county would be affected to the extent of \$14845 by reduction of the grants. Mr. Walter Kavanaugh said that

certain license duties had been earmarked to provide funds to assist lobeen overwhelmed with circulars and cal taxation in Ireland, but Mr. Lloyd George had put a tax upon spirits that had not only crushed out an industry of the country, but had reduced the revenue so much that it now unable to produce funds for the grants in aid of local taxation. The plaintiff's lawyer is today in the middle of a four-days' explanation of his client's position. Each day is costing about \$2500 in lawyers' fees alone. All told, nearly \$350,000 has been spent that way already.
