## MRS. DALE PRESTON PASSES TO BEYOND

### FOLLOWS HUSBAND ACROSS GREAT DIVIDE

#### Well Known Former Resident of Athena Dies in Walla Walla—Hardware Firm Sells Out—Basket Ball at High School.

Athena, Ore., Nov. 12.—Word reached here last night that Mrs. Dale Preston, sister of Mrs. M. L. Watts of this city, died in Walla Walla about 10:30 p. m. She was reported seriously ill a few days ago, and Mrs. Watts went over to Walla Walla last evening and arrived there just a short time before her sister died. Mrs. Preston, who is the widow of the late Dale Preston, deceased, who died only a few months ago, is very well known in this community having lived here for a number of years before she was married and for a few years after she became the wife of the late Dale Preston. The young people built them a fine home in this city, but sold it and moved to Walla Walla, where they have been living since that time. The news of the death of Dale Preston was a great shock to this entire community, and still more great is the shock of his wife's death in such a short time after. The young couple were very highly respected in this community and had a great number of friends, and the death of Mrs. Stella Preston places a sadness over the entire community, and much sympathy is extended the relatives of the deceased.

The hardware firm known as A. B. McEwen & Sons has recently sold its present store and consolidated the two. The store will change hands about the first of next month.

The high school basketball team of this city has recently been organized and a large hall has been secured and fixed up for the boys to play their games in. About 20 boys, the majority of whom have had some experience in that sport, have turned out to try for places for the team. The boys will be under the direction of Coach Ernest F. Wells, a graduate of U. of W., and a good team is predicted.

**RUSSIAN SABLES ARE RARER THAN EVER**  
London.—The supply of Russian fur-bearing animals, particularly sables, is yearly decreasing, and this fact is emphasized in a consular report.

The decrease, says the report, was especially noticeable in the far north, and hunters are of opinion that the cause of it there is the growth of the timber trade, which attracts workmen, and so gradually drives the animals away to the northeast. However, the Samoyed (a race inhabiting the extreme north of Russia) are said to have done very well this year, the more so since prices were high.

The rise in the price of sables is also explained by the fact that several big dealers came to the meeting place of the Tungux hunters, and ran up prices by bidding against each other. Some of them even went into the forests to intercept the hunters and bought before them came to the fair. The sable also is moving into more and more remote districts, to which the hunters have to follow.

### LLOYD GEORGE'S SPEECH STARTLES SLUGGISH LONDON

London.—The week has been fertile of sensations that have followed each other so rapidly that the public has hardly had time to take its breath. It opened with the splendidly dramatic flight of the Clement Bayard airship from Paris to London in six hours, an event compelling the most sluggish imagination to realize some of the revolutionary possibilities latent in the conquest of the air.

Then followed the immortal speech of Lloyd George, arraigning the idle rich, the echoes of which had hardly ceased to reverberate when attention was called to the magnificent audacity of Wellman's attempt to cross the Atlantic in the air. Then followed the alarmist stories, since contradicted, as to the approaching partition of Persia.

Quick on the heels of this came Balmour's alarmist speech demanding the expenditure of our last shilling, if necessary, in maintaining the supremacy of the British navy. All the week, also the political atmosphere has been thick with rumors as to the re-casting of the British constitution, as to the possible outcome of the conference on the crisis on a basis of home rule all around or imperial federation beginning at home.

The speech of Lloyd George, delivered on destitution, was an impassioned impeachment of the social system and a confidential appeal to the nation to undertake a revolutionary change in the distribution of wealth. It was the unanimous opinion of all present that Lloyd George would inevitably be the next liberal prime minister.

The speech, which seems to be a menace to all vested interests and

monopolies that are opposed to the general welfare, was hailed by the Times as an admirable example of sincerity, moderation and philosophical method. This declaration by the Times evoked even more consternation than the Lloyd George philippic against the idle rich.

### PARIS HAS U. S. HOLDUPS

Gang from America Operates in the French Capital.  
Paris.—A gang of American holdup men is operating in this city under the leadership of a noted English crook. Mademoiselle Bertrand had a disagreeable experience with them recently. She is a handsome woman, with a great weakness for jewelry, with which she bedecks herself abundantly before leaving home for a stroll to the music halls of Montmartre. The other evening she stalked into a cafe near the Moulin Rouge. Her diamonds literally blazed and her magnificence at once caught the attention of four young men who were at supper. With little or no ceremony an acquaintance was struck up and in a few minutes Mlle Bertrand was seated with the joyous party.

They were Americans, they told Mlle Bertrand, and as they spoke French with some difficulty, Mlle Bertrand saw no reason to disbelieve them. On the contrary she congratulated herself on having found what was certainly a party of those multi-millionaires. After supper a cab bore them to a dancing establishment where champagne flowed freely. When the night was over Mlle Bertrand was shown to her room by her new acquaintances. Hardly were they inside her room, however, than she was seized and raged by two of the men while the other two took her jewelry and purse. Her cries soon brought assistance and Mlle Bertrand gave a description of her assailants to the police. Three of the men were captured a few hours later and were identified as belonging to a band of road agents who have lately been acting profitably in the Montmartre quarter.

### "LIVE WIRES" WILL GET FREEDOM OF SPOKANE

Spokane, Wash.—The honorary freedom of the city of Spokane to be conferred on delegates to the first "Live Wire" convention of the north-west in connection with the third National Apple show, is the highest gift Columbia to receive this gift on November 14.

Six prominent citizens, known as "The Compurgators," will vouch for each delegate's worthiness in the following terms:

"That he is a man of good name and fame; that he does not desire the freedom of the city whereby to defraud the apple king of any of his royal majesty's rights, customs or advantages; but that he will pay his score and bear his lot; and so they all say."

The president of the conclave will address the delegates, enlarging on the deeds that make them worthy of the honor that is being bestowed and offer them the right hand of fellowship, also presenting decorated box, containing a copy of the vote of the conclave by which it was resolved that they should be honored with the freedom.

Each delegate will sign the following declaration:

"I do solemnly declare that I will be good and true to our sovereign, the apple king; that I will be obedient to the chief electrician of the 'Live Wire' conclave; that I will maintain the franchises and customs thereof, and will keep the city of Spokane harmless in that which in me is; that I will also keep the king's popularity in my own person; that I will know no conspiracies made against the king's peace, but I will warn the chief electrician thereof, or hinder it to my power; and that all these points and articles I will well and truly keep, according to the laws and customs of this city, to my power."
