

SUGGESTS BIG DAIRY SHOW FOR PORTLAND

DR. S. W. MCCLURE WANTS WESTERN DAIRY SHOW

Points Out That Such an Affair Would Be Great Success Owing to Natural Conditions Here in Oregon—Now in West.

"Portland should be the seat of a great Western Dairy Show," declared Dr. S. W. McClure, chief of the bureau of animal industry in the northwest. The entire west should be included as tributary territory, he says, and he insists that if Portland will promote the affair properly that in a few years it will grow to be the largest, most interesting and most successful livestock show held west of the Mississippi river. Portland, he holds, by reason of her central location, her transportation facilities and her ideal late fall and winter climate is the logical location for the greatest show in America with the possible exception of the national show held in Chicago.

In discussing the possibilities of a Western Dairy Show, Dr. McClure called attention to the wonderful success which had followed the founding of the national show. "The National Dairy Show was established only five years ago," he said, "but in that short period of time it has grown to be the most magnificent dairy proposition the world has ever seen."

"The show just closed in Chicago lasted for ten days and there were on exhibition more than 500 dairy cattle, representing 20 different states. The building was totally inadequate to accommodate the thousands who desired to attend and view the exhibitions. During the show an offer of \$10,000 was made and refused for a single bull."

"The show consisted of dairy cattle, the latest improved dairy machinery, sanitary dairy methods and appliances and everything related to progressive dairying."

"Oregon is particularly adapted to two lines of agriculture. The one is the production of fruit; the other is the dairy industry. Outside of these two lines she has no advantage over the other states of the union."

"Western Oregon should become the western dairy district in America. The natural advantages there presented to the industry are equalled at no other point in the universe and the state should exert a supreme effort to increase its dairy production 100 per cent."

"Today we are producing approximately \$15,000,000 worth of dairy products while our capacity is in excess of \$100,000,000. In Oregon at the present time are to be found dairy animals that would furnish the four-

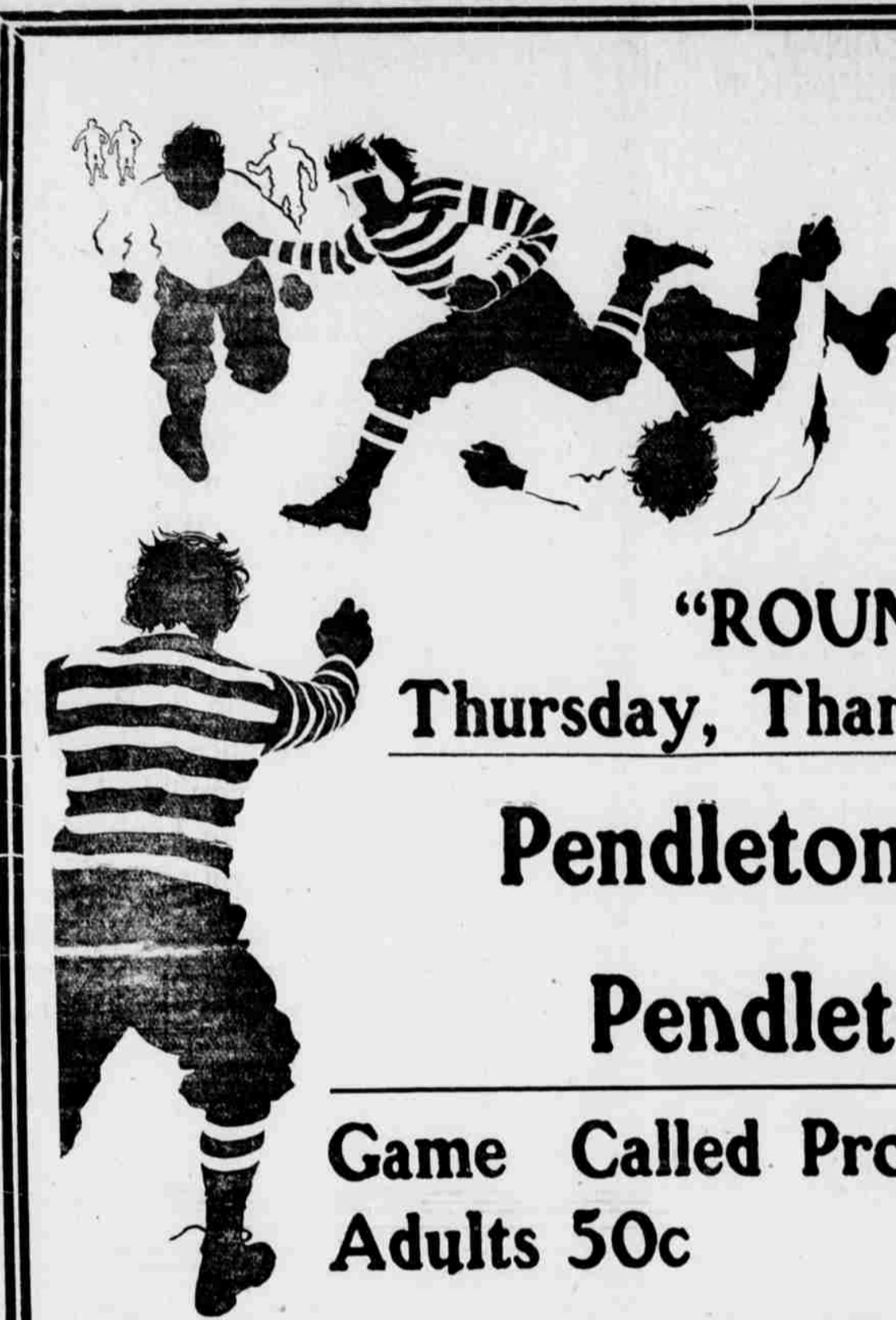

with the Auburn hair is on every package. For an immense dairy industry and by giving aid and every possible encouragement our wealth could be immeasurably increased.

"If Portland will promote and develop a Western Dairy Show it will in a few years become the largest and most interesting livestock exposition held west of the Mississippi river. The immediate result of such a show would be the stimulation of better dairy matters together with the immediate improvement of the quality of our dairy herds. Such a show would attract the attention of those interested in the dairy industry in other states and when they became acquainted with the possibilities in this direction, hundreds of them would flock to Oregon to engage in the industry."

"The show should consist of exhibits of all breeds of dairy cattle and all the implements pertaining to the dairy. During the exhibition a milk and butter test should be con-

ducted so as to prove the capacities of the various cows. "The exhibitors at such a show should receive liberal premiums, one-half of which should be paid by appropriation from the state and the other half collected from the various interest involved."

"So far as I know there is at the present time no exclusive dairy show held at any point west of Des Moines, Iowa, and Portland certainly offers a desirable field for a great western show of national reputation."

"It is generally believed that the average dairy cow in Oregon is no better than the average dairy cow in the United States, and this means that the average cow in this state barely pays for the feed she consumes. On the other hand we have in Oregon more than our share of the great record butter producers of the country and if every effort is directed during the next five or ten years toward increasing the quality of our dairy cows, the average product per cow per year can be doubled."

"The department of agriculture credits Oregon with about 170,000 dairy cows. There are probably not actually that number in the state, but western Oregon, in addition to her other stuff, is fully capable of maintaining more than half a million dairy cows."

BEAUTIFUL DUCHESS IN ROLE OF LECTURER

Edinburgh.—The beautiful Duchess of Sutherland, sister of the Countess of Warwick, has appeared as a literary lecturer at the Edinburgh Philosophical Institution.

She took as her subject "St. Evremont," a seventeenth century soldier, satirist, philosopher and man of the world, who spent fifty years of his career in France and the subsequent forty in exile in Great Britain. The Duchess said that St. Evremont was a star to the cultured circles of two countries, but that he had been little remembered by posterity at large. If his spirit of criticism was acute, he had a catholic appreciation of all that was best in philosophy and literature and without doubt he was tremendously attractive to his distinguished and adventurous comrades.

She gave an interesting sketch of the part filled by St. Evremont in English court and literary life till he found a resting place in the Poet's Corner of Westminster.

STANFIELD FRUIT GROWERS ORGANIZE

LITTLE TOWN HAS NEW BOOSTING ORGANIZATION

Will Promote Fruit Industry and Make Effort to Spread Reputation of Stanfield Abroad—Postoffice Is Moved.

(Special Correspondence.) Stanfield, Ore., Nov. 23.—"The Stanfield Fruit Growers' Association" is the name of an organization just perfected here for the development of the fruit industry and to promote

the welfare of those engaged in the production of fruit.

The officers are Thomas Richards, president; and A. W. Gray, secretary-treasurer.

For the present at least the organization will hold a meeting in Stanfield each Saturday.

An effort is to be made to enlist all the growers of fruit in this vicinity as members of the organization and it is hoped that in time the organization will be the means of enabling Stanfield to gain a reputation equal to that of Hood River.

The Stanfield postoffice has been moved into the Bell building. Its present quarters are very commodious as well as neat and would be a credit to a place of larger size.

Two new residences near this city are rapidly nearing completion. The one is being built by R. W. Copeland who arrived recently from Astoria,

while the other is being erected by F. A. Baker.

Moving Films of Germs.

London.—The remarkable possibilities of the cinematograph for teaching purposes have been demonstrated at an exhibition of bacteriological and pathological subjects given at the King's College hospital. Pathologists from most of the great London teaching hospitals watched with interest lifelike representations of all kinds of disease germs thrown on the cinematograph screen. The films depicting the germs of sleeping sickness swarming in the blood of an artificially infected rat, the bacteria, which infect the intestines of a mouse, and the state of a monkey's blood during the fever attacks, and in the intervals in relapsing fever were loudly applauded by the spectators.
