

OTHER PEOPLE LIKE OUR SALOON PLAN

Pendleton's new saloon regulating ordinance is giving the city much desirable advertising over the state. Many newspapers have commented editorially on the stringent provisions incorporated in the document and the general sentiment seems to be that other cities will eventually follow. A letter received by Judge Thomas Fitz Gerald, the city recorder, this morning bears out this prediction and shows that the pioneer trail which this city has blazed is likely to be quite generally traveled. The letter was from W. C. Hale, a prominent at-

torney of La Grande and follows in full: City Recorder, Pendleton, Oregon. Dear Sir:—I notice by the press that your city has passed a liquor ordinance that seems to meet the views of many people, and, as I am endeavoring to submit an ordinance to our council that will secure home rule and at the same time be fair and reasonable all around, I would like very much to have a full copy of your ordinance at once. REAL AND MYTHICAL GRADES OF COTTON

Washington.—Dealers in real cotton recognize nine grades of the staple but the New York stock exchange dabbles in 30 grades that are more or less mythical. Among experts there is not always agreement as to the grade of cotton in a bale and to overcome these disagreements the department of agriculture has prepared samples of each grade that will rank as the official standard in transactions in real cotton. The grades were established through the cooperation of experts in and out of the department and their distribution has been begun in order that the standards may apply to the crop season of 1910-11. The price of a set of samples is \$35, which is the cost of their preparation and it must be imposed under the law.

Leading men in the cotton business both in this country and in Europe, who have seen the official grades, have expressed themselves in terms of the highest commendation. The grades are elaborately prepared and the integrity of each type is attested by a full sized photograph secured in the box cover and bearing the signature of the secretary and the seal of the department of agriculture. The permanency of the standard is to be secured by the preservation of 25 sets in vacuum to be opened as occasion may demand for purposes of comparison.
