HOGS ALSO SOLD WELL YESTERDAY

Stock for Christmas Trade Not Good Returns to Sellers; Range of Prices and Sales in Portland Yards Yesterday.

Steer Price Record Broken.

The record for steer prices on this movement were broken yesterday at the Portland stockyards and with the sale of five head at \$6.75 per hundred pounds. The animals averaged 1540 pounds, and were shipped by Goodale & Cassidy from Gazelle, Cal. Two cows of the same lot brought the high record of the present movement at \$5.75. They averaged 1270 pounds.

Hogs sold at higher prices yesterday following recent advances in the east. One lot of 62 head that averaged 239 pounds, went at \$8.70, while another of 81 had averaging 237 pounds, went at \$8.85.

There was a good showing of livestock in the yards yesterday; the delayed shipments which should have arrived Wednesday being on hand for yesterday morning's trading.

There were two loads of fancy cattle for the Christmas trade from Gazelle, Cal., on today's market, but they were not sold this morning. It is not generally believed that they will bring more than recent sales of that character.

Of special mention in yesterday's transactions at the stockyards was the sale of 11 loads of cattle by Kidwell & Caswell, who feel them at Baker. Four lots of steers sold at \$5.50, while one lot of cows that averaged 1121 pounds went at \$5.50. The same people sold a bull at \$4.50 that weighed 1750 pounds. The entire lot was selected for Christmas killing.

THE WHEAT MARKET

FOREIGN REPORTS CAUSED BEARISHNESS

Argentina Shipments Triple Those of Year Ago—Range of Prices in Chicago Market.

Chicago, Dec. 17.—Wheat traders here were bearish yesterday in the face of improved foreign markets. Closing was 3-8c a bushel for the three options.

Opening of the wheat market here today reflected the bearish sentiment of the trade, but with the exception of the May quotations were unchanged from yesterday's closing. The May was 1-8c lower.

In the face of the smaller crop indicated by yesterday's government report, which showed a total of 695,443,000 bushels produced in the United States compared with 737,189,000 bushels a year ago, the pit trade sold short.

Even the higher cables failed to have a strengthening effect. Decreasing world's shipments were likewise of no avail to the bull side. Broomhall predicted world's shipments at 6,000,000 bushels, exclusive of North America. This compares with 5,622,000 bushels last week and 5,248,000 bushels for this same week in 1909. He likewise predicts a fair decrease on passage.

Argentina shipments of wheat were 1,044,000 bushels, compared with 376,000 bushels a year ago; corn, 1,505,000 bushels, compared with 1,340,000 bushels; Indian wheat shipments 480,000 bushels; Australian, 495,000 bushels.

JUDGE HUNT'S OREGON RECORD UNDER PROBE

Washington.—Improper admission of evidence and improper instructions to a jury in the case of the government against J. N. Williamson, Oregon's ex-representative in congress, when on trial in Portland several years ago, may cost Judge Hunt, of Montana, a place on the court of commerce.

The fact that Hunt was overruled by the supreme court on appeal and Williamson's case remanded for trial because of Hunt's error has been brought up as a reason why Hunt should not go upon the commerce court.

Before Hunt can be confirmed, the senate judiciary committee must be satisfied that Hunt's error was due solely to judgment and not to any influence that might have been brought to bear by Francis J. Heney, the government prosecutor. If it is shown that Hunt improperly admitted evidence that was improperly instructed the jury at the instigation of Heney, and to strengthen the government's case, he will not get a favorable report by the committee, and without such a report, cannot be confirmed.

The members of the committee are not inclined to discuss the charges that have been made against Hunt, but assurance is given that the charges will be probed thoroughly before any action is taken on the nomination. Hunt's nomination will not be acted upon this week.
