Extravagant Use. "In other cases farmers used large amounts of water without realizing how excessive was the use until measurements were taken. When the irrigation of the San Joaquin valley in California first began to apply water to what had been dry-farmed grain fields they frequently used over 9 feet. Now about one-third of this amount is found to be ample.
