"STUCK" MAIL KEEPS SPOKANE CLERKS BUSY. Spokane, Wash.—Tons of "stuck" mail are arriving in Spokane on every train and are now being "worked" at the Great Northern station by a large crew of railway mail clerks. "Stuck" mail consists of all classes of mail matter for the state of Washington which can not be subregated and "worked" enroute to Spokane. "The mails are not only heavier this year than usual," said Homer Elwell, chief clerk of the railway mail service, "but every train brings additional 'stuck' mail. Last year this mail began to arrive December 16 and 17. This year it began to come in bunches December 12 and 13, necessitating large crews at this end to segregate it and dispatch it through the proper channels to its destination.
