

LIVESTOCK IS QUIET IN PORTLAND MARKET

RECEIPTS SMALL BUT DEMAND IS VERY GOOD

Hogs Decline at Omaha—Cattle Strong in Chicago—Barley Market is Firm on Coast—Wheat remains Stagnant.

(Tuesday's Journal.) There was a small trade at the stockyards today, 143 hogs and 325 sheep being the total offerings. Hogs are quoted steady with sales for the day showing a range from \$8.50 to \$8.75. Better quality could have brought a dime more. This would be exactly the same price as ruled on this day a year ago.

Market for cattle is extremely firm with no supplies in for the day. Quite liberal supplies of good quality are expected tomorrow in time for the early market.

Considerable strength is now showing in the barley market and practically all interests are today quoted 323 a ton for No. 1 feed.

While there is a dull tone generally in the grain market, the strength remains pronounced for barley, although little business has recently passed.

There is more disposition on the part of oats holders to sell a few small lots and the highest bids on today range no higher than 328. In fact, this value is almost uniform in the city at this time.

Trade in the wheat market is quiet but steady. A few small lots are reported taken by exporters around 79c a bushel basis of track delivery for club and 82c for bluestem.

Market for flour is quiet but firm, with prices maintained both for export and local manufacture.

Millfeeds are steady with neither strength nor weakness displayed by values. Quotations generally in effect are: Bran, \$24 and \$24.50; shorts, \$26 and \$26.50; middlings, \$31.50 and \$32.00 a ton.

Pulp Bill Introduced.

Washington, Dec. 20.—A bill to promote commerce between the United States and foreign countries in wood pulp and the printing paper industry was introduced yesterday by Representative Ferris of Oklahoma. It provides that wood pulp and printing paper shall be admitted to the United States free of duty on condition that the government where it is produced and from which it is imported restricts the exportation or imposes an export charge.
