NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

Brewery Builds Warehouse.
Pasco, Wash.—The Olympia Brewing company has purchased a lot on Columbia street and will soon begin the erection of a large brick warehouse to be used presumably as a distributing warehouse.

Hog Record is Shattered.
Walla Walla, Wash.—One of the most noteworthy feats in hog raising is that of L. M. Green of Ferndale in this valley. Mr. Green last week killed two pigs, each seven months old and each weighing 399 pounds.

Baker Mills Take Contract.
Baker, Or.—The Oregon Mill & Grain company of this city has been awarded the contract for furnishing flour to the state penitentiary at Salem for the next six months, beginning January 1.

Power Plant on Lewis River.
Woodland, Wash.—Eastern capitalists are planning to build a large electric plant on Lewis river in Tum Tum canyon. Already considerable money has been expended in surveys and water rights.

Chinese Injured by Thugs.
Pullman, Wash.—"Bologna," Pullman's lone Chinaman, who lives in a house on the flats near the O. R. & N. depot, was almost killed by robbers who tried to get his hoarded wealth Monday night. The names of the robbers are known and their arrest is believed to be certain.

The Chinaman is suffering intense pain, but it is believed he will recover, although his head and face are frightfully cut and bruised.

Cross Grouse With Hets.
Boise, Idaho.—At the Joseph Kent ranch, 20 miles up the Boise river, is a freak of nature's handiwork which is probably unknown any place in the world according to a statement made by the well known mail carrier, G. F. Nelson. He states that grouse and chickens have crossed, making a new breed of fowl which roosts in the trees at night, feeds in the barnyard and is a fair layer of eggs at this season of the year.

Man Accidentally Shot.
Marshfield, Ore.—By the accidental discharge of a shotgun in the hands of E. L. C. Sarrin, Otto Schetter, local manager of the Western Union Telegraph company, was shot in the foot and amputation of that member was found necessary. The men were in a gasoline launch and Sarrin picked up the gun to extract a shell when it was discharged. Sarrin is an attorney of this city and the men were close friends.

Measles Take Lives.
The Dalles, Or.—Five deaths have occurred here in the past few days from the effects of measles, which have been prevalent for a month past. One victim was Mrs. Frank Craig who died at her home on Bluff street Monday evening. The others were infants, a 9 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Greene, a 2-months-old baby of Mr. and Mrs. James Hinds, a little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Vogle, aged a year and a half, and an infant son of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Watkins.

No Trace of Hunter.
Lebanon, Or.—No trace of Thomas Bond who disappeared from his cabin in the mountains near here December 6, has been discovered, and it is now believed that he either fell over a precipice or met with foul play. Credence is given to the latter theory because of the fact that he is said to have made some enemies while acting as deputy game warden. Although posses have searched the mountains in this vicinity for many days, there have been no clues that might aid them in discovering the cause of his disappearance.

Governor-elect Wilson's Birthday.
Princeton, Dec. 29.—Former president of Princeton University Woodrow Wilson, who will be governor of the state after the first of the year, celebrated his fifty-fourth birthday here today. Dr. Wilson is in the midst of a bitter factional fight over the election of a United States senator to succeed Senator John Keen, whose term expires March 4, 1911. He wants J. Martine ejected, while "Boss" Smith of the democratic party is active in his own interests. Smith has been conducting a violent campaign of personal abuse against Dr. Wilson.

TERSE TALES OF GOTHAM.

New York—Coincident with the return of Dr. Cook from his long self-imposed exile, a rather interesting story about Collander Peary is going the rounds of the newspaper offices and scientific clubs. Despite the fact that no one doubts that Peary discovered the north pole, it will be a long time before he becomes popular. He could go out tomorrow and discover the combination of the door of the New Jerusalem, and those who have come in contact with the eminent discoverer would just go away, wearing a peevish and blissful expression. And for this public attitude Peary has himself to blame. On the authority of those who have come most in contact with him, the man is sour, egotistic and domineering beyond words. It has been declared that he was needlessly cruel to those who accompanied him. An illustration of the manner in which Peary is regarded may be gained from the following story: When he was in the arctic, everyone of the white men attached to the party did their share of the killing. Peary himself did very little of the hunting owing to his lameness—he is short a handful of toes on the right foot. But when the expedition returned to America, Peary disposed of the skins and heads secured as his private property. The American Museum of Natural History in this city received a majority of the Arctic spoils. And its directors proved themselves men of magnanimity. They did not force an open break with Peary, but they quietly notified the others of the expedition that they had the privilege of selecting some of their loot of fur and horn. It has been quiet, not so much on Peary's account, as because it has seemed to some eminent men that the exposure of a selfish act would bring discredit on the nation.
