

WORLD'S WHEAT MARKET BULLISH

CONDITIONS IN PORTLAND ARE AT STANDSTILL

Barley Situation Firm—Foreign Markets Higher—Cattle Come from Utah—Scarce Elsewhere—Egg Prices Breaking.

There is little stirring in the local grain market at the present time, but today's advices from the outside were of an extremely bullish nature.

With a constant pulling down of the Argentina estimate and with less favorable prospects in continental Europe, it seems that some sort of buying movement will again appear abroad.

Exporters report actual purchases of club wheat on the basis of 79c to 86c a bushel track delivery (tidewater), the latter being their extreme high bid.

Millers on the other hand continue to quote 80@81c, but no sales are reported for their account recently.

While quiet, the barley situation is firm and exporters are still bidding \$23 for No. 1 feed and \$24 for brewing. There has been no resumption of demand for brewing barley from the east, but the trade at interior points is still holding for that account.

Situation in the oats trade is quiet with the market firm and little business in sight.

FOREIGN MARKETS HIGHER. Chicago Wheat Trade Forced Upward With Bullish News from Abroad.

Chicago, Dec. 28.—Ignoring at the start, the bullish foreign news wheat opened unchanged for the December and May while climbing 3-8c a bushel higher for the July. Closing was 1-4 to 1-2c higher than yesterday.

Liverpool was open today and showed the bulls in control. The market there opened steady 1-8d higher on account of the limited offerings and the more bullish news from Argentina as well as the European continent.

The decrease of 6-120,000 bushels in the European visible supply was rather startling and probably had more than anything else to do with holding the bears in check.

After the start this market developed considerable strength, although at no time was trade very heavy.

Pulp and Beef. There were quite heavy arrivals of cattle and sheep in the yards today, but the market was good.

Eleven loads of cows and steers came forward from the "pulp" district of Utah and sold at \$5.25 for cows, \$4.25 for bulls and \$6.25 for steers.

Egg Prices Tumbling. Egg market prices are tumbling badly and even then arrivals are harder to move.

While the general quotation for fresh ranch eggs today is 35c along Front street, lots of five cases or more could easily be purchased at 37c; therefore both of these figures must be claimed as the real market.

Receipts of eggs are increasing, although the increase is not nearly as great as expected. The trade is scared more than anything else; a condition usual at this time of the season.

Holders of storage goods make it a rule to shove all the goods possible upon the market after Christmas and naturally this calls for a reduction in quotations.

With stocks of storage eggs everywhere the heaviest in the history of the trade, holders are more scared this year than ever before.

Potatoes Remain Dull. Potato market is now quoted at San Francisco at practically the same price as previous to the recent break.

Dressed Meats Holding Firm. Dressed meats continue to hold firm in the local market, with receipts small and prices still at the high mark.

Butter Trade Better. Since the price on fresh creamery butter was dropped there has been a noticeable increase in the demand and all interests report their ability to clean up.

There is an excellent demand for chickens along Front street and prices are somewhat higher. The call for New Year's is expected to appear late this afternoon or tomorrow morning.
