Lyle is the eldest, being born on January 3, 1846 The second is J. H. yle, born on January 3, 1852, while Robert G. Lyle, a wealthy farmer and stockman, living near Pullman, Wash., first saw the light of day on January 3, 1862. The latter believes that his family has a record seldom if ever equaled in any on the continent. His laims are verified by documentary proof in the shape of city and county records, giving the date of births as already noted. Robert G. Lyle has been a resident of eastern Washington since territorial days. He has made a study of breeding cattle and other stock, also devoting much of his time to agriculture. SPOKANE HAS MORE THAN SCORE MILLIONAIRES


