ALL LIVESTOCK PRICES WERE EXTREMELY BULLISH

World's Wheat Markets Also Disclose Better Demand-Sharp Advance at Chicago-Turkeys Set New High Mark in Portland-Chickens in Demand.

(From Thursday's Journal.) Calves at Highest Price, Carsten Packing company of Ta-

coma paid \$8.25 for calves today in the North Portland yards, thereby breaking all previous high records here. The animals averaged about 220 pounds and were shipped by M. E. Holskiss from Idaho Falls, Idaho. "They were the best calves I have ever seen in the market." says William Burke, Jr., who closed the deal.

All Prices Bullish, Livestock prices were extremely bullish here today and prices are generally higher, with the exception of one lot of hogs \$8.95 was paid today, as compared with the recent high value, in face of the recent decline in shading is expected. the east and central west.

Lower prices prevailed for hogs at Chicago, where prices closed 15c lower today. At Omaha hog values were down 10e to 15c, with prices be-tween \$7.50 and \$7.70. This would make the landing price here for Nebraska hogs \$5.90, or a nickel under the price received at North Portland this morning.

Cattle market was far more bullish than ever before in this territory. Only a small supply was visible and this was picked up generally at an advance of about 25c over last quotation, or about 75c above those in effect two weeks ago. Cows that averaged 912 pounds went at \$5.10, al-though one animal of excellent quality that weighed 1060 pounds went to the new high record at \$5.75. A bull sold yesterday at \$3.75 that could have been duplicated a few weeks ago at \$2.50, and four steers that averaged 902 pounds went at \$5.35. an unheard of figure heretofore for this class of offerings.




