##### Berries on New Year's Day.

Wallace, Idaho.—Caught in a snowslide for which they were immediately responsible, Russell F. Collins and William Conover, residents of Spokane, had a narrow escape from death Saturday on the mountain side above Burke.

##### Miner Killed in Slide.

Grants Pass, Or.—The funeral will be held this afternoon of W. J. McDow, who was caught in a slide while mining Friday near Swede Basin. He died near Love station on the way to Grants Pass. He was aged 63 and leaves a wife and several children.

##### Seattle Honors City Founder.

Seattle.—The funeral of Mrs. A. A. Denny, one of the pioneers of the Puget sound country, took place yesterday afternoon, and hundreds journeyed to the cemetery to do honor to this grand old woman, who helped her husband in establishing the city of Seattle. Mrs. Denny came to this section 60 years ago.

##### Grants Pass Votes "Wet."

Grants Pass, Or.—The election held Saturday under home rule was closely contested and a large vote was cast on the question: "Shall the city council be authorized to license saloons?" There was 49 majority for a "wet" town. Probably action will be brought to test the constitutionality of the home rule bill, as Josephine county voted dry at the last general election.

##### He Settles for Kisses.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Archibald T. Derington has paid into the county's funds, through the superior court, the \$500 taxed against him by a jury in the last term of court, for the two kisses he took from Mrs. Elate Van Zant, a Spokane widow. Mrs. Van Zant valued her osculatory embraces at \$2500 each, owing to the fact that

they were forced from her, but the court decided that \$250 was a good price for a kiss.

##### BALLINGER PROMISES TO AID UMATILLA PROJECT

In a telegram to the Portland Commercial Club Secretary the club that Ballinger assures the club that necessary investigations will be made at once to ascertain if Oregon has been overlooked in getting its proportionate share of the \$20,000,000 reclamation fund apportioned by President Taft, says the Journal. Oregon's share, according to the apportionment, is but \$925,000, whereas the state has turned something like \$6,000,000 in to the fund and this insignificant amount would fall far short of carrying on the projects already under way and in such a shape that heavy losses would be sustained. Secretary Ballinger's telegram reads:

"Washington, D. C., Dec. 31. "Portland Commercial Club:—Personally believe West Umatilla project should be undertaken by government as soon as funds can be commanded for its construction upon satisfactory assurance from the service that funds are or will be available to commence and complete this project. I shall use my utmost endeavor to secure its undertaking. The necessary investigation will be made without delay. "BALLINGER."

Miss Anis Barnes returned to her school work in Adams Monday after spending Sunday at home in Weston.

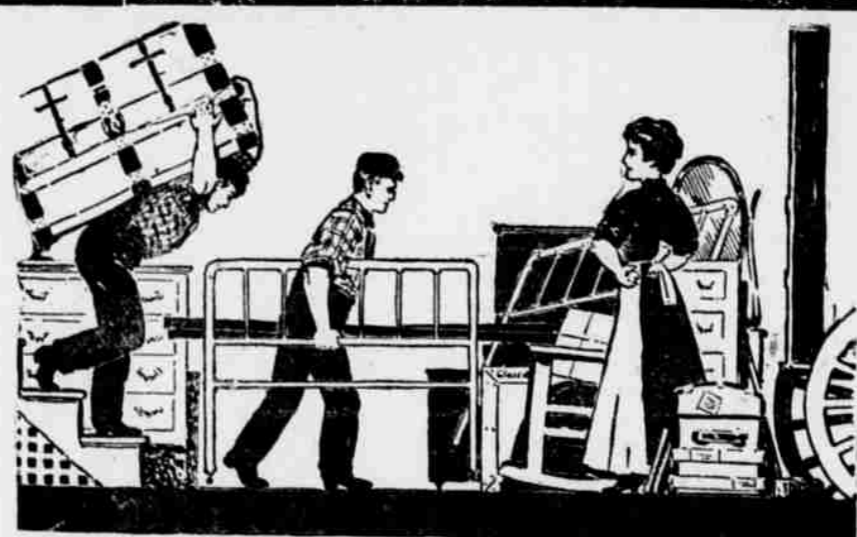
Miss Beebe, teacher of Adams high school, returned to Adams Monday morning after spending the holidays at home with friends and relatives in the city of Portland.
