ENTRUSTED WIFE "TO THE LORD"

SALEM WOMAN PROTESTS—SAYS HUSBY SHOULD PROVIDE

Tongue's of Fire Preacher in Spokane Defendant in Divorce Suit—Only Rice Found in Family Larder.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 9.—Because her husband entrusted her care and keeping "to the Lord," as alleged in the complaint, Rowena Florence Ryan has commenced suit for divorce from Martin Lawrence Ryan, a preacher at Spokane, representing the creed known as "Tongues of Fire," or "Religion of Unknown Tongues."

The complaint says that she followed her husband on wanderings through many states in the Union until finally he decided to go to Japan and she, with her children, accompanied him to that country. There she states, they had little sustenance and went through trials and hardships, the whole family larder at one time consisting of a cup of rice. She claims that her trials and hardships were made the subject of publication in numerous religious journals until they became a matter of almost national notoriety.

She induced her husband to return to Oregon, she alleges, but later he went to Spokane. She has five minor children. She alleges that although her husband is able to command a salary of \$4000 a year he has provided practically nothing for the family for some time, giving all of his substance to others and stating that the Lord will provide for his wife and children.

Will Not Oppose Suit.

Spokane, Jan. 9.—The Rev. Martin Lawrence Ryan is in Spokane conducting a series of meetings at the Apostolic Assembly, Front avenue and Howard street. He says he has been a believer in the faith which he preaches for seven years, and is a man of many vocations. He has been a newspaper publisher, book agent, preacher, foreign missionary and writer. But he has given up all to the preaching of the Apostolic faith, and has depended on the Lord for sustenance. He said last night the Lord had provided pretty well for him, but his wife did not agree with him.

HILL GIVES \$50,000 TO "OLD WILLAMETTE"

Salem, Ore., Jan. 7.—President Fletcher Homan of Willamette University, today announced the receipt of a letter from James J. Hill promising an endowment fund of \$50,000 for Willamette providing Mr. Homan raised not less than \$250,000 additional. Mr. Hill gives the Oregon school two years in which to raise this sum.
In addition to the promised endowment from Mr. Hill the president of the institution announced today he had received a provisional offer of \$100,000 from R. A. Booth, the Eugene lumberman, contingent upon the school raising a total endowment fund of \$500,000. Alumni and friends of the school have already promised \$50,000 as a start with which to meet the conditions prescribed by Mr. Booth and Mr. Hill.
Mr. Hill's letter to President Homan reads:
"St. Paul, Jan. 3.—Mr. Fletcher Homan, president Willamette university, Salem, Or.—Dear Sir: In response to your letter of the 16th ultimo, I wish to say that I will give \$50,000 as endowment fund for your university whenever you have raised not less than \$250,000 in cash in addition to my subscription.
"The above is to be for a permanent endowment fund, the income from which is to go to the university. "Funds for building or other improvements not to be counted or considered part of the arrangement.
"The offer to remain open for two years, and advice to be furnished from time to time of the progress being made in the collection of the fund. Yours truly,
"JAMES J. HILL."

MERCHANTS WOULD CURTAIL CREDITS

Spokane, Wash.—Members of the Inland Empire Retail Dealers' association, representing more than 100 cities and towns in eastern Washington and Oregon, north and central Idaho and western Montana will discuss ways and means of curtailing credits and legislation prohibiting false and misleading advertisements at the annual convention in Spokane, January 15 and 16. There will also be discussions on measures to amend the pharmacy act and resolutions urging the payment of wages to public officials and employees at not exceeding semi-monthly intervals and weakly or semi-monthly payment of wages to laborers and mechanics.
The annual smoker and high jinks will take place in the armory the evening of January 19, the manufacturers and wholesalers of Spokane being hosts. The invitation gives this intimation of what may be expected:
"Bring along 'the glad hand' and 'the eagle eye.' Everything else will be supplied. The prettiest girls and classiest vaudeville stunts obtainable have been imported at great expense, and oratory such as is rarely uncorrupted save before crowned heads will bubble in short spasms. Start the year right by getting on good terms with yourself and your neighbors."
