COURT CHANGES CAUSE SOME DELAY

NO WITNESSES SUMMONED IN CRIMINAL CASES

January Term Convened With Judge Phelps on Bench—Grand Jury Is Drawn and Will Go to Work Tomorrow.

With Judge G. W. Phelps on the bench, the regular January term of the circuit court was convened this morning at 10 o'clock but owing to the disorder attending the change in the offices of circuit judge and district attorney there will not be much accomplished this week. Judge Bean, before retiring, had not set the date of hearing for any of the civil cases and consequently no witnesses had been subpoenaed and because of the delay in the appointment of the district attorney, the criminal cases are not yet in readiness.

Following is the grand jury which was drawn immediately after the opening of court: Abner Rugg, foreman, Henry Groth, J. B. Gross, Iley Winn, Mark Moorhouse, Dan Shaw and J. A. Martin. In instructing the jury before it commenced its duties, Judge Phelps read the sections relating to violations of local option law, libel law and the law prohibiting prizefighting.

The docket was called and several civil cases were dismissed by motion of the attorneys, following which Judge Phelps set the case of Barnes vs. Brown for hearing next Monday morning at 10 o'clock to be followed by the Phillips vs. Harder case. Court then took recess until 1:30 this afternoon, when the ventremen were excused from further attendance until next Monday morning. The grand jury, however, will be in session tomorrow and will continue its labors throughout the week.

Deeds to Asylum Site.

The deeds to the Oliver tract which was selected as the site for the branch asylum were received by Recorder Burroughs this morning from the secretary of state.

The county court has committed Dave Nelson a well known resident of this county to the poor farm. Mr. Nelson is 87 years old and is extremely feeble.

Stewart Creek Ranch Sold.

John Vasher this afternoon sold his 240 acre ranch on Stewart creek to Julia R. Luhrs for a consideration of \$3800. The sale was made through E. T. Wade.

Two New Caterpillars.

E. L. Smith, the local agent, has received two new caterpillar engines for Matilla county farmers. He unloaded them this morning and they were taken through Main street under their own power.

Funeral of Child.

The funeral of Nadine Dupuis, the three year old child of C. F. Dupuis, who died Friday night at St. Anthony's hospital following an operation for gangrene of the intestines, was held from the local Catholic church yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

New County Physician.

The new county court has appointed Dr. H. S. Garfield as county physician to succeed Dr. W. G. Cole and he will begin his duties immediately. The court was not in session this morning owing to the absence of Commissioner Lee who was detained at home by the illness of his daughter.

Big Reward Offered.

Chief of Police Gurdane is today posting notices received from Mayor Pratt of Spokane offering \$7500 reward for the apprehension of the person who shot and killed Capt. J. F. Sullivan of that city last week. The reward is offered by the Spokane city council.

Club Will Meet.

The members of the Thursday Afternoon club will hold their regular meeting next Thursday, January 12, at the home of Mrs. W. A. Slusher, with Mrs. Alice Sheridan hostess. Mrs. Stephen A. Lowell will be hostess on January 19, instead of the 12th as per club calendar.

Sunday Was Dry Day.

There were no attempts to violate the provisions of the ordinance which prohibits the sale of liquor on Sunday yesterday, according to Chief of Police Gurdane. In several instances, however, he was called upon to accompany the owner of a saloon to his place of business in order that the latter could enter.

Improving Hotel Lobby.

At the Hotel St. George carpenters are at work today tearing out a partition directly in the rear of the counter. Now that he has moved his bar to the old restaurant room Mr. Darveau will enlarge the hotel lobby by moving the partition back some 20 feet. The change will make the St. George lobby nearly twice as large as it has been in the past.

Elks Stag Social.

Preparations are still being made for the big stag social to be held tomorrow night by the local Elks and from appearances the coming event will be about the greatest occurrence in the history of Pendleton lodge. Will Gray, chairman of the committee, is now in Portland and while there is boosting the coming social and enlisting some entertainers for tomorrow night.

Seven Drunks in Court.

Seven men were brought before Judge Fitz Gerald this morning to answer to charges of being drunk. They gave their names as Jack Bennett, Frank Windom, E. Cudless, John Anderson, Neil McDennet, Arthur Hill and W. E. Harbert. They all pleaded guilty and were given the option of three days in jail or a five dollar fine. McDennet was the only one to put up the cash and the rest are now serving out their time.

LEGISLATURE IS IN SESSION.

gon the good roads state of the nation in ten years, and a number of other measures of state importance, if not of national interest.

Reform legislation will probably occupy most of the session at Salem this year and while much of this legislation may not pass it is believed that no corporation measures or laws weakening any of the initiative system already in force or effect will be adopted.

Control in Doubt.

The fight in Oregon this year was between the old republican machine and the insurgents. The republican regulars adopted an "assembly" ticket and though it lost the governorship and the Multnomah county delega-

tion and several southern Oregon delegations, in the house and senate, the state generally elected a large number of assembly republicans.

The balance of power between the assembly and anti-assembly republicans is yet in doubt. Just now the assembly leaders are making every effort to elect Jay Bowerman, defeated candidate for governor, as president of the senate, and to elect an assembly man as speaker of the house. Should the regulars succeed in their efforts, assemblymen probably would be appointed to the important committees and there is a possibility that they would be able to kill some of the so-called reform legislation by passing other bills with an emergency clause attached. Such action would prevent them being defeated later by the people under the referendum.

West Holds Power.

The weak link in the chain, however, is that Oswald West will be governor. West was elected on a direct primary, initiative and referendum platform after a bitter fight. Naturally very little assembly legislation will get his veto and as the vote now stands it is so close that it is improbable that many measures can be passed over his veto.

The session probably will be the last stand of the republican party as a closed corporation in Oregon. Within two years initiative legislation will probably be passed that will enable the voters to elect the speaker of the house and president of the senate. This will put to rout all rings, assemblies and other efforts at machine organization, and Oregon will be in a position to give the theory of direct primary and the fullest possible ideas of direct government the acid test of practice.

RAIN DAMAGES AIR SHIPS IN FRISCO

San Francisco, Jan. 9.—Rain today not only put a stop to the aviation meet here but entailed serious loss to aviators through damage by moisture to their machines. More than a dozen aeroplanes were exposed for hours in a leaky open-ended hangars and suffered badly loosened hinges where glue instead of bolts were used. The wings were most badly affected.

Glen Curtis' standard machine was ruined. Brookins and Parmales' Standard and Baby Wright racers suffered a similar fate. Latham and Radley were the most fortunate but they spent most of the time today wiping off pools of water on their wings. There will be no further flights until the weather clears.

PRESIDENT DIAZ FIRES MEMBERS OF COURT

Mexico City, Jan. 9.—General Cozlo has resigned as minister of war. Minister of Finance Limantour has signified his intention of retiring and other members of President Diaz's cabinet will be changed as a result of the poor showing being made by the government against the revolutionists. It is reported. Cozlo withdrew after a long conference with Diaz. It is reported he was severely criticized because the revolutionary movement had not been stamped out.

DEFENDERS WIN IN BIG NAVAL WAR GAME

Washington, D. C., Jan. 9.—After a seven-day game of hide and seek, the seven scout cruisers, constituting the "defenders" scored a victory today over the 15 battleships of the attacking fleet in the naval game. A wireless from Rear Admiral Stanton, commanding the defenders, to the navy department today, said the battleships were intercepted enroute to Guantanamo. This is equivalent to a capture, so the Atlantic seaboard is safe from an attack now.

JOHNSON WANTS TO FIGHT JEFFRIES AGAIN

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 9.—Peeved at the stories that Jeffries was doped before the Reno encounter, Johnson today offered to meet Jim in a return battle. He said he wanted to prove the dope yard is a fake. He said: "I would demand a good purse but nothing unreasonable."

WEST VIRGINIA BANK ROBBED OF \$1300

Wheeling, West Virginia, Jan. 9.—The First National Bank of Elm Grove was robbed of \$12,659 some time Saturday or Sunday. The thieves entered, secured the money and escaped. Elm Grove is a town of about one thousand inhabitants, near this city.

Mrs. Martin to Be Tried.

Newark, N. J., Jan. 9.—After a long legal battle over the question of her sanity, Mrs. Caroline B. Martin must go to trial today, charged with the murder of her daughter, Mrs. Ocey Wardlaw Martin Snead, the young woman who was found dead in a bathtub in an East Orange house over a year ago. Mrs. Mary W. Snead, mother-in-law of the dead young woman, is also waiting trial for complicity in the crime. Miss Virginia Wardlaw, aunt of the bathtub victim, was also arrested, but died while awaiting trial. For months the counsel for Mrs. Martin have been trying to have her declared insane, but Judge Ten Eyck, after hearing much evidence, finally declared that the accused woman is in her right mind.

Helpful Hen Has Her Day.

Dallas, Tex., Jan. 9.—Cotton, corn, coal and other boasted products of the southwest have nothing on the helpful hen as a money producer, according to statistics given out by the Southwestern Poultry association which opened its annual show in Dallas today. Prize fowls worth many thousands of dollars are exhibited by breeders of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Louisiana and other states.

VACANCY EXISTS IN HIGH SCHOOL FACULTY

There is another vacancy in the faculty of the high school. Prof. M. S. Pate having resigned his position as instructor in the agricultural department to accept the superintendency of the Athena public schools. Prof. Pate has only been on the local faculty since the beginning of the fall term but during his service has given such satisfaction that when Superintendent C. C. Baker of Athena, was compelled to resign on account of the serious illness of his wife, he was called to fill the vacancy. Mrs. Pate had previously secured a position in the Athena schools and both commenced their new duties this morning.

As yet no one has been elected to fill the vacancy caused by Prof. Pate's resignation, but Superintendent Landers stated this morning that an effort is now being made to secure a thorough agriculture man from the Oregon agricultural college or from Washington state college, falling in which the board would get into communication with some eastern agricultural college. Ernest Wells, assistant principal of Athena high school, was strong-

ly considered at first but at the earnest solicitation of the Athena school board he was not elected.

As all of the classes are now doing review work preparatory to the regular examinations, the vacancy will not affect the work in the high school to any great extent, and Superintendent Landers states that the new instructor will be here the commencement of the second semester, which is on January 23. There will be a meeting of the school board tonight to consider the securing of a competent man.
