DIVORCEES BARRED.

Victims of Marital Unrest Unwelcome at British Court.

The late Sir Henry Irving was several times invited by King Edward VII, when Prince of Wales, to dine at Marlborough House. But, although honored by the crown with a knighthood—in token of appreciation of his art—yet he died without ever having attained the distinction of presentation at court, owing to the rule, dating from hundreds of years ago, which bars out members of the theatrical profession.

Among the obstacles which it is necessary to enumerate is that of divorce. The fact that a woman has figured in a divorce suit, either as plaintiff or as defendant, renders her presentation at any European court a matter of extreme difficulty. During the reign of Queen Victoria, the only divorcee whom she permitted to appear at court was the present Duke of Marlborough's mother, the Marchioness of Blandford, whom she had known from childhood, and for whose matrimonial unhappiness she manifested the most profound sympathy. All other divorced women were excluded, no matter how blameless their conduct, and how imperative the conditions that compelled them to seek the dissolution of their marriage.—The Munsey.

La Grande Instructor Resigns.
 La Grande, Ore.—Professor Roy L. Clark, instructor of history of the La Grande high school, resigned at the school board meeting Saturday night and will leave for California.

Storm in Blue Mountains.
 Dayton, Wash.—A storm is raging in the Blue mountains. Travel was practically suspended yesterday and rural mail carriers were forced to turn back 10 miles east of here.

Idaho Cattle Sell High.
 Grangeville, Idaho.—A new record for beef cattle prices was established here yesterday by the sale of 31 head of 18-months-old steers to Ed Knorr for \$60 per head. The steers were raised by Fred Hunt, a farmer from the Toio district.

Stockings Poison Idaho Girl.
 Grangeville, Idaho.—Anna Wilson, the 12-year-old daughter of J. W. Wilson, was operated on yesterday for blood poisoning, supposed to have been contracted from wearing improperly dyed stockings.

Wind Blows Down Power Line.
 La Grande, Ore.—The heavy wind in the Grande Ronde valley have blown down one of the high power line poles and shut off the electric power at La Grande. The mercury reached 29 above and several water pipes were frozen.

Opera Opens La Grande School.
 La Grande, Ore.—The new high school auditorium will be opened February 3 and 4, when the opera, "Pinafore," under the direction of Martin E. Robinson, will be presented. The entire company is made up of local talent entirely from the high school.

Baptist Pastor Asks Divorce.
 North Yakima, Wash.—Wilmont E. Zediker, osteopathic physician and Baptist minister, started suit for divorce today in the superior court, alleging that his wife, Mary Alice Zediker, is insanely jealous of him and has frequently wronged him by accusing him of criminal relations.

Yakima Vets to Celebrate.
 North Yakima, Wash.—Spanish-American war veterans started arrangements last night for a celebration of their 12th anniversary of "baptism of fire in battle." The North Yakima men were engaged in a battle in the Philippines just 12 years ago on February 4. Officers were elected last night.

Electric Switch at Yakima.
 North Yakima, Wash.—Contracts between the Federal Signal company and the North Coast railroad for installation of the electrical interlocking switch at Parker were placed on file today showing a consideration of \$8720 for this device. The work will be completed in about three weeks.

Jail Sentence for Jokers.
 Wallace, Idaho.—For attempting to make J. C. Gallup stand a treat with the 70 cents they alleged he had, and which he denied and took a beating rather than stand and deliver, John White and George Murphy were today sentenced to 60 days in the county jail.

Close Gambling at La Grande.
 La Grande, Ore.—The police have found evidences of gambling in a La Grande pool hall and one arrest was made today. The manager, a Greek of the Pastime poolroom is to be arraigned this afternoon. Open gambling is alleged. A colored porter at the Foley hotel barbershop has been charged with wagering money on dice.

Elevator Boy Falls Out.
 Walla Walla, Wash.—Forest Fain, a brand-new elevator boy, signaled his entrance into his new duties at the Drumheller building this morning by opening the elevator shaft door and stepping off into space. Fortunately he picked out the first floor for this act and came to a stop on the basement floor, but a few feet below.

Bacon Thief at Walla Walla.
 Walla Walla, Wash.—Somebody emulated Jack Johnson and brought home the bacon early Sunday morning. The fact was discovered by the proprietor of the Walla Walla Meat and Cold storage company this morning when they opened their market on South First street and discovered a thief had broken the rear window and entered. One side of bacon was stolen.

BIRTHDAY OF A PARLIAMENTARIAN.

Congressman-elect Asher Hinds of Maine, who has never outlived the sobriquet of "Tom Reed's apprentice," despite his splendid work as clerk to the speaker of the house of representatives, is forty-eight years old today. He claims Benton, Me., as a native birth. Colby college gave him his A. B. in 1883 and an LL. D. about six years ago.

Hinds ran for congress in the last campaign, and was elected. No one will dispute that he is the greatest living authority on parliamentary procedure in congress and this knowledge will enable him to become a great power the moment he takes his seat in the house. He has written several books on parliamentary law, but the men who have read them can be counted on the fingers of one hand, and never has one risen up to dispute any statement made therein. "As interesting as the dictionary," said a friend of Hinds, one day, and "much less in demand."

In the forthcoming bitter debates in which the minority party, under Cannon's leadership, will do its utmost to taunt and vex the democrats, Mr. Hinds will be uncle Joe's chief lieutenant. Indeed, when this young man from Maine was nominated for a seat down among the mere members many representatives predicted that in the coming congress he would be running back and forth most of the time between his desk and the speaker's throne. But now the prophecy is that the next republican minority leader will have Mr. Hinds directly beside him.

Newspaper work sharpened Hinds for a public career. When he was fresh from college he became an editorial writer on the Portland Advertiser, and a year later joined the editorial staff of the Portland Press, with which he was afterward connected for several years. When Reed became speaker, he took Hinds to Washington with him and made him "speaker's clerk." Although he was then a youngster of only twenty-seven he made good and when Reed was elected speaker again in 1895 he made him clerk of the speaker's table, in which place he became so invaluable that Speakers Henderson and Cannon were glad to hang on to him. He burns much midnight oil pondering over precedents. He has been married about twenty years and his home is in Portland, Me.
