TO APPROPRIATE ADVERTISING FUND

Salem, Ore., Feb. 1.—Corresponding with the suggestions made before the joint assembly of the Oregon legislature by Louis W. Hill, of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroad systems Monday at noon, Representative James D. Abbott of Multnomah county yesterday introduced a bill in the house appropriating \$20,000 for advertising and procuring desirable immigrants for the great unsettled farming districts of the state of Oregon. A state immigration agent is to be created who is to serve without compensation to collect statistical information regarding the state's resources, industries, products and physical characteristics.
 The state immigration agent is to co-operate with the Oregon Development league and the Oregon Agricultural college and also is to communicate with the commissioner general of immigration of the federal government regarding the disposal and handling of desirable prospective citizens. The immigrant agent is to be appointed by the governor and he is required to report the results of his collection of information to the secretary of state November 20, of each year, who is authorized thereupon to issue a pamphlet containing the information gathered by the immigration agent.
 Additional appropriation of \$5000 is provided for statistical research, but all the state departments are to be drawn upon liberally by the immigration agent for such information as may be of use to him.

HOUSE BILL LIMITS POWER OF SECRETARY

Salem, Ore., Feb. 1.—Judge Derby, representative from Wasco and Hood River, has introduced a bill in the house which gives the assistant secretary of state all the necessary authority to act in the place of the secretary of state during the secretary's absence from the state but does not permit him to sit or to deliberate with the governor and state treasurer in the transaction of state business as does the Bowerman bill passed by the senate yesterday.
 Representative Collins has a measure providing that the county court shall call a special election to determine whether the county seat shall be moved upon petition of two-thirds of the voters and Representative McKinney has introduced a measure providing that the matter of increasing the salaries of all county officials shall be determined by the voters of the county upon their petition to the county court and the enactments relative to the operation of the initiative and referendum are to be employed in carrying out the purposes of the act.
 Representative Gill of Hood River and Wasco would prohibit the use of roller towels and public drinking cups in all public places such as hotels and passenger coaches.
 While waiting for winter to come, spring has evidently arrived.

Increase in Canada's Revenue.
 Consul Paul Lang writes from Sherbrooke that the financial statement of the Dominion for the nine months ended \$5,605,834, a betterment of \$12,276,762 over the same period in 1909. The expenditure was \$52,994,133, an increase of \$5,596,093. The expenditure on capital account was \$22,504,247, nearly the whole amount being expended on the National Transcontinental Railway.

Natal Business Notes.
 The population of Natal at the close of 1909 was 1,218,034, consisting of 92,643 Europeans, 1,027,677 natives, and 118,714 Asiatics.
 The 42 foreign insurance companies transacting business in Natal qualified by depositing securities with the treasurer to the total value of \$2,000,000. Only three are American companies.
