

### GOOD QUALITY BEEF IN STRONG DEMAND

ORDINARY STUFF IS DRUG ON MARKET

Hogs Show Weakness—Sheep are slow—Oats decline—Eggs steady—Poultry weakens.

(Tuesday's Journal.) Good quality steers are in demand in the Portland market at this time and of this quality there are not enough supplies offering. Killers have their requirements of ordinary and poor stuff—in fact too many of these are already held by packers for the good of the market, but none would be able to resist a shipment of superior quality.

Outside of the one carload of cattle and hogs shipped by J. S. Milne from The Dalles, there were no arrivals in the North Portland market today. Latest sales of cattle clearly confirm the early reports given out by The Journal yesterday—but as has been stated previously this applies more to ordinary and poor quality than to real good stuff. The cattle market is in a position where much harm could be done the price by too liberal offering. So far as known no big movement is now enroute to this market from outside sections and it is not likely that any big run will suddenly show up from the home territory. The home section has not been a free offerer of cattle during recent weeks and this is why killers and their representatives went to extreme points to bring in supplies, thereby holding in check a spirited advance that would have been forced by reason of small supplies here.

Market for hogs reflects weakness. Latest sales in the North Portland yards were at a decline of 15 cents from the previous high points and for the present market \$3.50 seems to be the extreme top even for light stuff. It is the lighter swine that tops the market here and elsewhere at this time.

Heavy hogs are much in the majority and these are finding little favor from any interest even down to \$3. Packers still incline to the opinion that they will get cheaper hogs around March and therefore are operating on a small way except for block stock.


Sheep market is still slow with sales generally around the former range.

World's Wheat Market. Portland—Cash club, 79@80c; bluestem, 82@84c.

No. 1 white oats are being generally quoted 50c a ton lower with the extreme quotation to producers at \$28 a ton but with most dealers unwilling to offer more than \$27.50. Gray oats are quoted about 50c a ton under this.

Wheat market is steady again with club at 79@80c and bluestem showing a range from 82 to 84c a bushel basis track delivery. Exporters are again in the market for supplies but their wants are limited. There was further weakness in foreign wheat markets today with lower prices generally in effect. Barley trade remains quiet. Flour is generally quiet for both domestic and export account.

EGG MARKET IS STEADY. Sales Being Made from 29 to 29 1-2c; California Prices Higher.

Market for eggs is steady again along Front street and supplies are generally cleaning up at 29@29 1-2 c a dozen. There are higher quotations in California, making importations of fresh stock impossible at the moment. Best eggs are quoted today in San Francisco at 33 1-2c a dozen.

POULTRY MARKET WEAKER. Accumulating Supplies Again Showing; Easier Tone All Around.

Further weakness is showing in the poultry market along Front street and accumulations are generally shown. Stock that was carried over from Saturday were again carried over yesterday. Prices are generally a shade easier.

DRESSED BEEF HOLDS WELL. Front Street Has an Unusual Demand Owing to High Packers' Prices.

Front street is usually a poor place to sell dressed beef owing to the inadequate facilities and the infrequent arrivals, but at this time a good tone is showing. This is due to the high values packers are asking. All sorts are now in demand. There remains a weak tone on hogs but veal is steady again.

POTATO MARKET ADVANCED. Selected Offerings Quoted at \$1.75 Cental by Jobbers on Street.

Selected potatoes are being quoted firm at \$1.75 per cental by jobbers along Front street with good stock selling at \$1.60@1.65 and ordinary goods at \$1.50. Offerings of potatoes from the country are limited.

### RAILROAD NOTES.

A three per cent dividend on Reading common will be paid tomorrow. Proposed advances in freight rates tomorrow have again been postponed to March 15. Reductions in rates for Pullman lower berths northwest of Chicago will become effective tomorrow. An extension of the telephone dispatching system on the main line of the Lehigh Valley will be made tomorrow.

A memorial fountain in honor of the late E. H. Harriman is being erected at Goshen, N. Y., and will be unveiled February 25. A dividend of one-half of one per cent for the quarter ending December 31 will be paid tomorrow on the capital stock of the Norfolk Southern.

Coupons of the first mortgage bonds of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient fall due tomorrow and will be paid at the American Exchange National Bank, New York.

Twenty million dollars of general mortgage four per cent bonds are offered by the Reading to provide funds for the retirement of consolidated mortgage bonds falling due June 1. Upper berths in Pullman sleeping cars operated in New York state will be reduced after today from \$1.50 to \$1.25, and from \$2 to \$1.60, and from \$2.50 to \$2, and the same general reduction will be made all over the country.
