SEWER SYSTEM TO BE EXTENDED

COUNCIL TAKES ACTION IN SPECIAL MEETING

Outlet Will be Extended One Mile
Southwest of Present Outlet and
Service Will be Extended to West
End Residents.

As announced briefly in these columns yesterday, the city council met in a session extraordinary at 3:30 in the afternoon and adopted resolutions to extend the outlet of the Pendleton sewer system one mile southwesterly of the present outlet, thus removing one of the obstacles in the way of locating the branch asylum down the river. Opponents of the site selected have been making argument out of the fact that the sewer outlet of the city is above the Oliver tract and would thus contaminate the water supply of the asylum should it be located there. The action of the council will effectually silence this argument.

Following is a copy of the resolutions as adopted and which were telegraphed immediately to the legislature:

Whereas, the present outlet of the sewer system of the city of Pendleton is insufficient to afford sewer connections to a large amount of property within the city of Pendleton; and

Whereas, the present location of the outlet of the sewer system of the city is unsatisfactory to property holders in the vicinity thereof; and

Whereas proper sewer drainage and a satisfactory outlet can only be secured by extending the present sewer system a distance of one mile southwesterly from the present outlet, therefore, be it

Resolved by the common council that the sewer system of the city of Pendleton be extended so that the outlet thereof shall be one mile southwesterly of the present outlet of such system; be it further

Resolved, that the sewer committee of the common council and the city attorney be and are hereby instructed to take the necessary proceedings for such an extension.

Wants Mortgage Foreclosed.
V. H. Rogers vs. J. W. McDonald and J. S. Wicksham is the title of a suit filed in the office of the county clerk today by J. B. Perry. The plaintiff alleges he holds a note for \$500 from McDonald on which only \$500 has been paid and that the balance is over due. He asks for judgment for the remaining \$7200 with interest and \$720 attorney fees and asks that certain property of defendant on which he holds mortgage be sold at sheriff's sale. He also asks that his mortgage be held a prior lien on property to any title or claim which Wicksham may have.

A Delicate Operation.
Dr. C. J. Smith on Monday performed one of the most delicate operations known to medical science and perhaps the only one of its kind ever performed in the county. It was the placing of a silver plate in the forehead of Arthur Bell, the young Cabbage Hill man, who was injured in a train accident in this city last November. At that time a piece of the skull, 2 1/2 by 1 1/4 inches in dimensions, was removed and a small part of the brain removed. The wound healed over, but the brain had no protection and could be seen pulsating at that spot. The slightest blow there would have been sufficient to induce death. The plate was made by Dr. Thomas, Vaughan, the dentist. The operation was successfully performed and the patient is recovering rapidly. Altogether, the doctors agree that Bell is a very fortunate man and they attribute his recovery from the original fracture to the quickness with which he was operated on, only thirteen minutes having elapsed between the time of the accident and his arrival at the hospital.

May Bar Freshmen.
New York, Feb. 8.—A new rule barring freshmen from participation in college athletic meets was formulated today and will be brought up for action at the meeting of the Intercollegiate Amateur Athletic association, to be held in this city Feb. 25.

Quarrelled Over Codfish.

Famous Music Editor and Critic to be in Pendleton Friday.

W. L. Hubbard needs little or no introduction, for his name is known in nearly every music-loving community throughout the length and breadth of the land.
