C. P. Bishop, president of the Pendleton woolen mill, left today for Portland on business connected with the "Made in Oregon" exposition that is shortly to be held in that city.

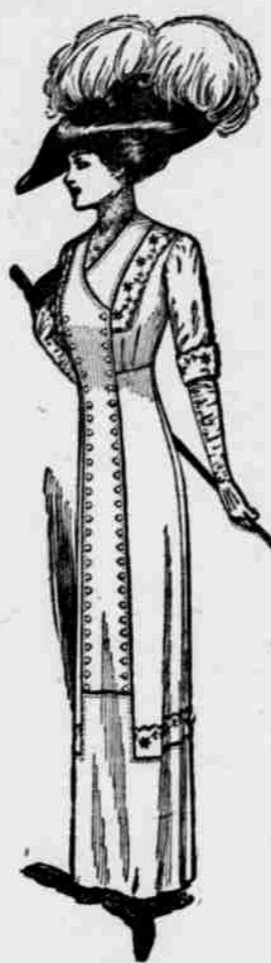

## SOME OF OREGON'S NEW STATUTES

The following is a list of the bills vetoed by the governor or which have become laws, either with or without his signature:

S. B. 37--By Nottingham, allowing judgments for liens for material and labor to be obtained against a homestead.  
S. B. 39--By Nottingham, to prevent adulteration of linseed oil.  
H. B. 73--By Thompson, amending law by which J. Thorburn Ross was convicted.  
**Bills Approved by the Governor.**  
S. B. 15--By Kellaher, authorizing the construction of the Broadway bridge.  
S. B. 61--By Lester, authorizing Clatsop county to levy a special tax for Astoria centennial.  
H. B. 3--By Cole, setting aside October 12 as a holiday to be known as Columbus day.  
H. B. 46--By Neuner, making it a crime to dump refuse into Umpqua river.  
H. B. 82--By Fouts, providing that convict made goods be labeled.

S. B. 2--By Hawley, relating to the naming of farms.  
S. B. 7--By Burgess, prohibiting the sale of large firecrackers.  
S. B. 10--By Malarkey, relating to the adoption of children.  
S. B. 13--By Locke, authorizing counties to build pauper hospitals.  
S. B. 19--By Locke, providing for the registration and examination of graduate nurses.  
S. B. 26--By Oliver, relating to the license fees of mining corporations.  
S. B. 53--By McColloch, fixing the times for holding the terms of the circuit court for the Eighth judicial district.  
S. B. 47--By Oliver, fixing the times for holding the terms of the circuit court for the Tenth judicial district.  
S. B. 98--By Merryman, prohibiting the location of saloons near public works.  
S. B. 100--By Oliver, satisfying the claims of Union county against its sheriff and county treasurer.  
S. B. 105--By Dimick, fixing the boundary between Marion and Clackamas counties.  
S. B. 134--By Barrett of Umatilla, providing traveling expenses for county school superintendents.  
S. B. 181--By Abraham, providing care for cemeteries.  
H. B. 6--By Buchanan, protecting secret orders from imposters.  
H. B. 18--By Abbott, regulating sailor boarding houses.  
H. B. 37--By Brooke, making it a crime to desert sheep on the range.  
H. B. 57--By Fouts, regulating the transportation of explosives.  
H. B. 100--By Buchanan, relating to admission to the soldiers' home.  
H. B. 102--By Miller of Columbia, relating to licenses for the sale of intoxicants.  
H. B. 113--By Miller of Linn, relating to settlements of county treasurer.  
H. B. 129--By Ambrose, relating to

practice of optometry.  
H. B. 138--By Abbott, providing a free ferry at St. Johns.  
H. B. 155--By Beals, providing times for holding terms of county court in Tillamook county.  
H. B. 204--By Brooks, relating to the terms of the supreme court.  
H. B. 213--By Powell, remunerating George Nessling for injuries received in active service for the state of Oregon.
