STANFIELD CATTLE TOP THE MARKET

CHOICE UMATILLA COUNTY STEERS COMMAND PREMIUM

Many Cattle and Sheep But Few Hogs Appear — Porkers Advancing in Chicago and Omaha—Eastern Eggs for Northwest.

(Thursday's Journal.) A shipment of a carload of selected cattle from Stanfield, Or., was sold in the North Portland yards at a premium of fully 10c over any recent transaction. Steers brought as high as \$6.85.

There were heavy offerings of cattle and sheep in the yards today, but only a small number of hogs put in an appearance. Cattle shipments from Utah include 10 cars, and from Montana three cars. Then there were liberal offerings from Oregon and Idaho points.

During the morning's trade there was little change in the general livestock situation. Good cattle continued in demand, but off grade quality was not sought. Sheep remain weak on account of the overloaded condition of the trade, this week's shipments to date breaking all recent records.

Selling by sheepmen is said to be influenced both by the poor outlook for prices in the immediate future and the fact that March 1 is again tax date. Therefore the desire to unload as quickly as possible.

OMAHA SWINE DIME HIGHER.

Market Is Strong With Receipts of 7500 in the Yards During Day. South Omaha, Neb., Feb. 16.—Cattle—Receipts, 2500; market, dull and unchanged. Steers, \$6.64; cows and heifers, \$4.50 to \$5.50.

Hogs—Receipts, 7500; market, 10c higher. Sales, \$7.05 to \$7.20. Sheep—Receipts, 4000; market, steady to strong. Yearlings, \$4.85 to \$5; wethers, \$4 to \$4.35; lambs, \$5.85 to \$6; ewes, \$4 to \$4.35.

CHICAGO HOGS HIGHER.

Market Is Strong to a Nickel Up; Receipts 10,000 Less Than Year Ago. Chicago, Feb. 16.—Estimated receipts: Hogs, 15,000. Cattle, 5000; sheep, 12,000.

Hogs are strong to 5c up; left over, \$8.90; receipts a year ago, 25,000. Mixed, \$6.90 to \$7.40; heavy, \$7 to \$7.30; rough, \$6.80 to \$6.95; light, \$7.15 to \$7.59. Cattle, steady. Sheep, steady.

Poultry Higher.

Poultry market prices are another half cent higher today although receipts were quite fair this morning along the street.

The advance is due to the smaller arrivals during the early part of the week. This is the day when buyers are usually the most eager to take hold of live birds and for that reason the shipments to produce row were quickly picked up at the advanced figure.

The advance in poultry applies principally to chickens for geese and ducks are unchanged and few coming forward at this time and demand just about equal.

Turkeys are not nearly so firm, especially ordinary quality. While it is quite possible to unload offerings of medium sized birds of quality around 25c a pound, heavy birds or "skates" are hard to sell even as low as 20 to 21c. This is for dressed stock. Live turkeys of quality will sell at as good a price as dressed stock of ordinary showing.

Eastern Eggs Weaken Market.

Eggs were weaker in the local market as the result of heavier offerings of fresh stock from the east. Many leading dealers here are receiving telegraphic advices from the east offering the fresh candled eggs at 19 1/2 to 20c a dozen on board cars at postpaid.

MORE OFFER POTATOES.

Producers Not Holding So Tight and \$1.25 Is Being Accepted.

Producers are much more inclined to offer potatoes around \$1.25 for good quality but dealers are buying sparingly. The roads are still in very poor condition, making immediate delivery practically impossible in most sections.

On account of the recent cold snap, quite a large supply of onions was damaged and these are being offered by jobbers as low as \$2 per cental. Best stock at \$2.50 to \$2.65.

Millers Cut Flour Prices.

As has been forecasted in this paper during the past 48 hours, the price of patent flour has dropped 20c a barrel in the local market, or the first change for many months. The decline places patents at \$4.85.

A drop of 90c a barrel in the price of export flour was a surprise because millers had declared right along that they could not make a concession in this grade. The orient, however, has demanded the change. In view of the recent decline of silver of an amount that would aggregate about 15c a barrel gold for flour. Therefore the drop of 10c was somewhat of a compromise.

Millers dropped the price of wheat at the same time as making the change in flour. They put the price from 1c to 2c a bushel lower with club at 78 to 79c and bluestem 80 to 81c. Exporters on the other hand would not bid above 78c for club, basis track delivery tide-water, but were offering from 81c to 82c a bushel for bluestem, the latter for California account.

Trade in coarse grains is very slow locally. Some No. 1 feed barley is being taken around \$23.50, but all the brewing is in demand at much higher prices for eastern movement.

Oats movement is limited with more offerings by holders at \$27 to \$27.50 a ton.

Hay is slow at yesterday's price.
