### CHICKENS NEAR HIGHEST MARK

LIVE BIRDS SELL FOR TWENTY CENTS POUND

Scarcity of Supply Combined With Increased Consumption Causes the Buyers to Bid Up.

(Wednesday's Journal.)

With live chickens selling as high as 20c a pound in the Front street market, today's values are within a notch of the highest price ever recorded here.

There has been a scarcity of offerings in the chicken market recently, and this, together with the greater consumptive demand, has caused the trade to bid higher in order to get its normal supply.

While chickens are roosting unusually high, there is stagnation in the turkey trade. Some supplies that reached the street nearly a week ago are still being carried over, owing to the lack of demand. Prices have been steadily reduced by sellers, but even this has failed to attract the attention of buyers. Live turkeys are now slow and not easily moved at 20 cents a pound, while dressed stock is but a couple of cents above this.

There is only a limited call for ducks and geese, and in this line prices continue nominal, with no general change in the situation thus far the present week.

**Sheep Market Drops.**  
Some extra fine lambs sold in the North Portland yards late today at \$5.50 or 15c lower than the same class of stuff would have brought a few days ago. The market for sheep and lambs is weaker and poor quality is hard to sell even at materially reduced prices.

Additional strength is showing in the cattle market and latest sales are a fraction above what the same sort of stuff would have brought a day or so ago.

While there was a big run of cattle in the yards today, as well as a heavy showing of sheep and lambs; most of the arrivals in the former line were for through shipment and did not enter the trade here at all. The shipment that went to the north consisted of 15 cars and came from California.

Four loads of cattle came forward from Montana this morning. Three loads sold at \$6.35 and one load at \$6.10. They were not weighed up until a late hour.

No hogs arrived in the yards today, and quotations in that line are nominally the same as last Saturday, when the last shipment came forward.

Shippers are flooding the sheep market with supplies and for that reason most sales are made rather low. Ewes sold around \$4, while some feed lambs went at \$4.50 @ 7c.

**Holiday Observed.**  
Washington's birthday was celebrated in the Chicago and other American grain exchanges and while Liverpool was open, the local trade took a holiday and conditions remain much the same as noted yesterday. There is growing weakness in the wheat and flour situation. Some of the smaller millers are again cutting patents from 19 to 15c a barrel but the flats are being maintained by all of the larger mills so far as patent is concerned.

While there is talk that some of the millers on the sound have been offering export to the orient at \$3.50 the reports are not given any credence by the local trade. The orient recently made an attempt to purchase export here at \$3.50 from a large miller but the offer was rejected. On the other hand flour brokers state that they have been offered and sold flour enough to dispose of export down to \$3.40 but the volume of business at this basis is considered too nominal to base any quotations thereon.

Hay market is very weak. According to buyers everyone in the country is seemingly anxious to dispose of supplies at lower prices.

Oats and barley trade nominal and unchanged today.

### LEGISLATURE HITS AT LIQUOR TRAFFIC

The recent session of the legislature placed itself on record as favoring the curbing of the liquor traffic, says the Journal. Two laws, placing restrictions upon it, were passed. A third, even more severe, went through the house easily, but eastern Oregon men in the senate contrived to kill it because of the effect it would have upon their section of the state.

The most important of the new laws which relates to the liquor question is contained in a bill presented by Senator Dimick of Oregon City. It prohibits the consumption of liquor in any railroad depot, bans the use of liquor on trains, except in the dining cars, and makes any intoxicated person entering a train subject to a penalty.

This bill, unless vetoed, will probably have a far reaching effect and perhaps more so than the author had in mind. In Portland, for instance, it compels the saloon now located in the Oregon Electric railway depot at the foot of Jefferson street to go out of business. There are said to be similar situations in other parts of the state which would be affected.

The second bill passed by the house was one introduced by Representative Gill of Wasco county. It reads in part as follows:

"No person shall be permitted to sell spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or fermented cider, commonly known as hard cider, or near beer, in this

state, without having first obtained a license from the county court of the proper county for that purpose and in no place where any college or university is now or shall hereafter be located, for a distance of one mile or more from thereto, where such sales are now being made under such license. No license shall be granted for such sales within a distance of one mile from any college or university."

The provisions of this act, however, do not apply to any city or town now incorporated.

The bill defeated by the eastern Oregon senators was presented by Judge Derby of Hood River. It prevented incorporation of towns having a population of less than 500. The fact that under the present law any group of persons may incorporate and sell liquor in a "dry" county, no matter how far they may be, has been the cause of much complaint and it was proposed to remedy this situation.

Towns of 500 are not very numerous in eastern Oregon, however, and the delegation from that district claims it would work a hardship upon them and they obtained the defeat of the bill in the senate.

Boston, Feb. 23.—Letters written by Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, in 1876, following the publication of her "Science and Health With Key to the Scriptures," are included among the belongings of the late Christian science leader and founder, which were offered at auction today. Among the offerings were an engraved announcement of her marriage to Dr. Eddy and a letter which tells how she fell in love with the man who became her husband. The letter is as follows:

"Agreeable to my word, I write you a line, not that I have anything especial to say, but that I want to say something of my late experience. "The day after my return home I had a violent seizure.
