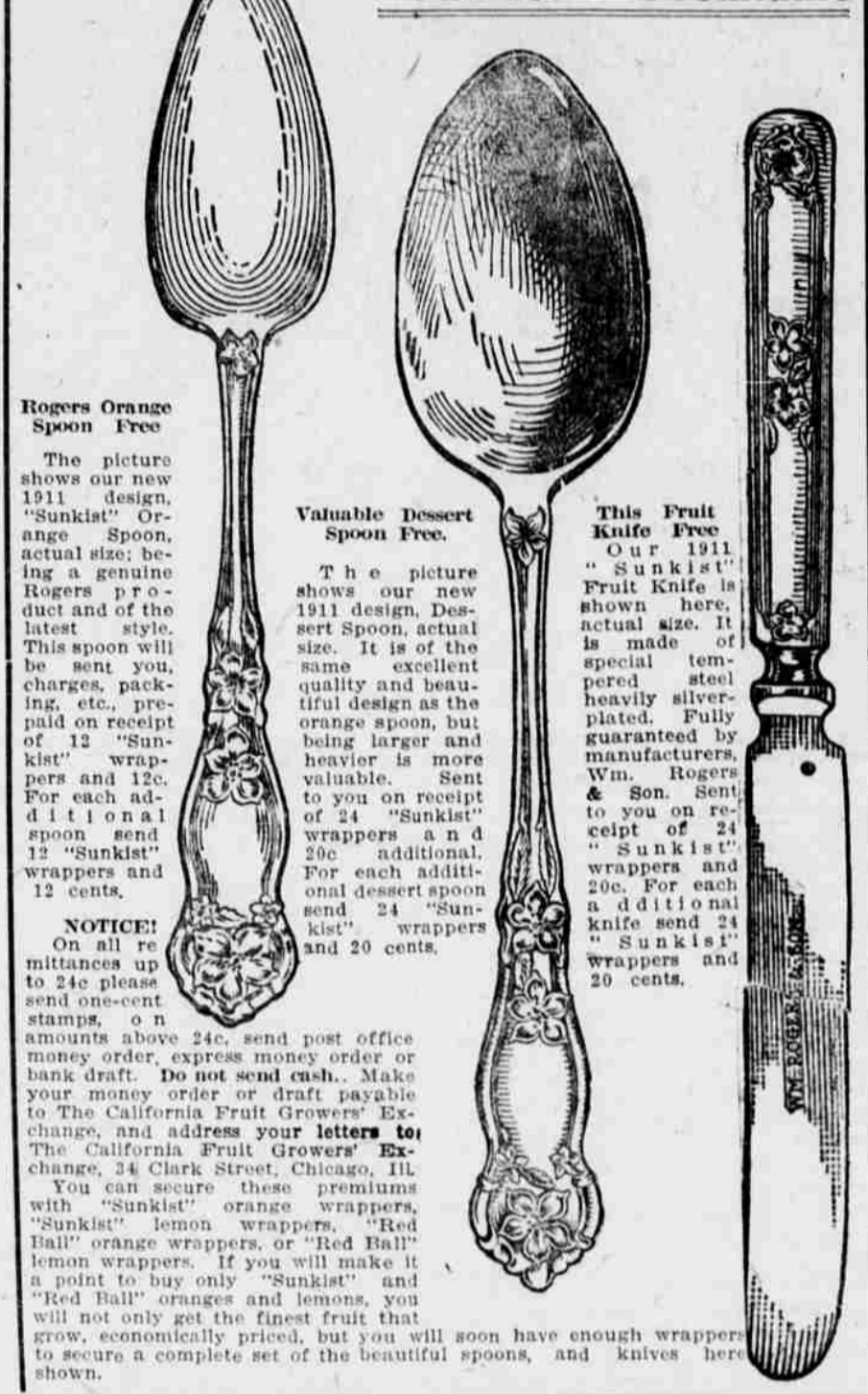

GOULD DREAM MAY NEVER COME TRUE

George J. Gould's retirement from the presidency of the Missouri Pacific next month probably means that the scheme for a Gould road from the Atlantic to the Pacific, a dream cherished by the financier for many years will never be realized. At the same time, it is likely that the plan will be carried to completion by other interests. In the furtherance of his dream of an ocean-to-ocean line, Gould built the Western Pacific from Ogden, Utah to San Francisco. The Denver & Rio Grande from Denver to Ogden, and the Missouri Pacific from St. Louis to Denver, were the other links in the chain. At the same time Mr. Gould attempted to move eastward by means of the Wabash and the Western Maryland, the latter designed to be the final link in the transatlantic chain. Then antagonistic interests in the Wabash balked his attempt to use that property, the Western Maryland went into the hands of a receiver, and, finally, Mr. Gould is to lose supremacy in the Missouri Pacific.
